RALEIGH.

A Variety of News From the Official State Centre.

Rev. Mr. Dixon Preparing a Book.

Auditorium meeting Friday. Chief Fair Marshal. Text Book Commission. Final work.

RALEIGH, April 30.--Farm work is very active. The ground is in fine condition for planting.

The news that the damage to fruit in this State was greatly exaggerated, is very gratifying.

Rev. Thomas Dixon is here, and at work in the State Library securing data regarding the reconstruction period in this State, for publication in a book.

The Commissioner of Agriculture says fertilizer sales are falling off very rapidly.

The removal of the military stores from the State arsenal began today.

It is learned that there will be a large attendance of the Daughters of the Confederacy from this State at the reunion and general convention at Memphis next month.

The auditorium stockholders are called to meet Friday. It is understood they will yield to public sentiment and buy the property adjoining the Academy of Music, enlarge the latter and make it a spacious theatre and auditorium. This plan has complete popular approval.

The lawyers and the insurance agents here are practicing for a game of base ball, in aid of a charity in this city.

In the Superior Court here today there was a trial of the \$10,000 libel suit of John B. Husey vs. The News and Observer. There are many witnesses, among them ex-Congress Grady, of Duplin; J. F. Williams and B. F. Pear, of Kernersville.

President Cox, of the State Fair announces that General Wm. P. Roberts accepts the appointment as chief marshal. The executive committee of the fair adopted resolutions expressing its pleasure at this appointment and acceptance.

The sub-committee of the text-book commission found it could finish business at last night's session and did so. Its work covered a period of thirty working days, beginning March 30th. There are ten members. They were paid \$4 per diem and all expenses and ten cents mileage. It required about \$1,700 to pay them. Their report was handed in today.

Mrs. Ship and Mrs. Robert Thompson, daughters of F. H. Busbee, Esq., have returned here, the first from a visit to the battlefield of Santiago de Cuba, where her husband was killed in action; the latter from Bremen, Germany.

HILL NOT READY.

Not to Make a Trip Through the South Regarding Suggestions of Candidates at This Time Premature.

ALBANY, N. Y., 29.--Ex-Governor David B. Hill today gave out the following statement: "My attention has been called to the story which is going the rounds of the press that I am expecting to make a political trip through the West and South, either this year or next. I desire to state that I do not contemplate any such trip. "I will state further that I am not a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1904. I am neither seeking the nomination, nor expecting it. I regard all suggestions of candidates at this time premature and inadvisable. No one can tell now what can or ought to be done in 1904."

Soldiers' Home Arrangements.

RALEIGH, April 30.--This morning State Auditor Dixon sent out a notice to the directors of the Soldiers' Home, calling on them to meet here next Monday to make all the arrangements about the home.

Work is now in progress at the Home in the way of beautifying the grounds. The fences have been removed.

MRS. NATION INSANE.

The Saloon-Wrecker Attacks One of Her Friends in Jail and is Placed in Solitary Confinement.

WICHITA, Kan., April 29.--Mrs. Carrie Nation, the saloon wrecker, has broken down and is supposed to be insane. The crisis in her condition followed a term of solitary confinement and the receipt of the news of her brother's death. It is thought by physicians who have examined her that she will soon recover, but it is believed by others that her condition is hopeless.

On Thursday Mrs. Nation had a fight with her friend, Mrs. Wilhoit, who was confined in the same cell. She accused Mrs. Wilhoit of being two-faced and said she was a spy of the saloon men to get evidence against her and that she cast evil spells upon her cause. Mrs. Nation slapped Mrs. Wilhoit and pulled her nose.

Sheriff Simmons was forced to place Mrs. Nation in solitary confinement in the rotary cell. She was also put on the bread and water diet.

On Saturday morning news came here that her brother was dying at Lewisburg and she was advised to accept bail at once and go to him. James Ray, her attorney, and Wilbert Jones, her former bondsman, and best friend, visited the jail and asked to see her. They explained the reasons she should accept bond.

Mrs. Nation stared at them, then burst into a hysterical fit and against them and said if she wanted to get out she would fly. This alarmed her friends, who summoned her physician.

He stated that she was insane. David Nation, her husband, was notified.

Mrs. Nation was much better late tonight and accepted bail. It was announced that she would be released in the custody of friends.

CAN'T BE BURIED.

Laughing Hart not Allowed to Experiment on his Assistant.

SCROLLS, Va., April 30.--Because its clergymen prayed to Mayor Brewer to prohibit an experiment, burial the Mayor has agreed to the prohibition, and J. Will Brinkhouse will not be interred alive next Thursday, as advertised. Instead there will be a window sleep, for they have this afternoon engaged a window in the postoffice building for a demonstration of hypnotic influence.

The ministers assert that the "exhibition will be detrimental to the moral tone of the community," and further that it will tend to terrify ignorance, cheapen the sanctity of human life, and to furnish the vicious and unscrupulous suggestions in methods of suicide.

"It has a tendency to be blasphemous and is dangerous," says the Town Attorney.

"It is neither heinous, immoral, or grotesque," declares Stanley Wade, clerk of the court.

"I don't mind being buried, I am of vigorous mind," says the subject, who says he wishes to be buried in the cemetery of the town.

He is now in the hospital, but he is not yet out of his bed. He has a reputation for a man of sound mind. He is a native of the town, and he is a member of the church.
