THE GIBSON CASE.

ficer Dixon Suspended for Alleged As-nault on Prisoner, Council Will

About noon on Sanday John Gibson white man, drauk and disorderly, wa ted on South Front street by Office J. B. Dixon and placed in jail. He was severely clubbed on the head and a warrant was taken out against Dixon charg-ing him with assault. The matter came up in the Mayor's court yesterday moreing and an extraordinary amount of interest was manifested in the case, the City Hall being filled with a large crowd

to hear the case Mr. R. B. Nigon appeared for Gibeo and L. J. Moore Esq for officer Dixon. The charge against Gibson of being drunk and disorderly was first called and a plea of guilty was put in. Gibson looked much the worse for his day's performance and his face was badly bruised under the left eye. A number of witnesses were called to prove that the officer had used unnecessary violence upon his prisoner.

Alf Bragg, J. O. Baxter, P. Harrison. W. T. Hill, J. T. Kendall of Goldsboro Will Paris and Charlle l'aul, all testified substantially the same, that on the way from the place of arrest at long whaif to the station the officer struck Gibson three times, and that Gibson was making no effort to resist, only holding back as a drunken man would, and that he was cursing, using profane language, Officer Dixon holding him by one arm and C. H. Strickland by the other. Each of these witnesses testified to the places on the street where the blows were given. On the cross examination, Bragg admitted that he was unfriendly to Dixon and Harrison that Officer Dixon had

just cause. Charlie Strickland testified that Dixon had called him to assist arrest Gibson, that he came and took hold of one arm. that on the way Dixon struck the prison er, that he remonstrated and that Dixon hit him again. He said that Gibson had a razor handle, that he would swear that

arrested him, but that it was without

Gibson held a razor handle in his hand. Capt. Gatlin testified that he had asked officer Dixon to take Gibson away as he was drunk misbehaving and cursing, that he had a knife in his pocket or up his sleeve, that Gibson hed followed him up on the street, useing curse words.

Officer J. B. Dixon said that he had seen called to arrest Gibson, that Gibson said there was no warrant issued and he could not arrest him, that Gibson cursed him loudly and struck him with his fist on the side of the head, that he then struck Gibson with his club, pulled him to the ground and called Strickland to as sist, that on the way to the station he had not struck the prisoner, only made passes at him to quiet him, had no ill celling in the matter, had been 10 years on the police force, never convicted of seing undue violence.

Mayor Patterson then said he would suspend Officer Dixon until tonight and that the matter would be left to the Board of Aldermen to decide upon. The Mayor then took occasion to correct any impression that might be entertained that an officer did not have a perfect right to club a prisoner if he resisted arrest or showed fight. As Gibson had been already severely punished a small he was released upon the surety of Attorney Nixon.
