Inmate Soldiers Home Dishonorably Discharged.

Dr. Dixon For Head of Soldiers Home. Suit by Barkeepers Against Cities. Bank Statement Called For.

RALEIGH, May 7.—W. W. Kelley, the inmate of the Home, who after the investigation yesterday was dishonorably discharged, was in Co. B, 31st, N. C. Regiment, and deserted near Charleston, S. C. in 1888, came home to this county, and hid in the woods until the close of the war. Your correspondent was the first to print the charge of the desertion. The board of directors is glad the light was thus turned on.

There is a desire that Dr. B. F. Dixon should be at the head of the Soldiers Home. As yet the board of directors has not arranged who shall be at its head. Dr. Dixon has leased the old Cotton Mansion, very near the Home, will live there, and will devote part of the day to the Home. There is no salary attached to the position. It is a labor of love.

There is, as stated, a suit here against this city by bar-keepers whose places of business are beyond the boundary, but who have had to pay taxes. The amount claimed is \$12,000. The suit is against Fayetteville, if it is necessary. It will be brought at the same time as the one here. The amount claimed at Fayetteville is something like \$1,500.

Ex-Judge Shepherd left today for Philadelphia, to take testimony as a standing master in the great suit of Arenas vs. the American Tobacco Company.

Julius S. Mann, the new superintendent of the penitentiary, resigns as director and James G. Hackett, a large farmer of Wilkes county, is appointed by Gov. Aycock to fill the vacancy.

The corporation commission calls for a statement of condition of banks up to April 24.

The baccalaureate sermon (before the students of Shaw University colored) was preached Sunday. The preacher advised the negroes to apply themselves to trades and work and to eschew politics and idleness and assured them that there was as much race prejudice on their part against the whites as on the part of the whites against them.

Judge Starbuck discharged the jury in the \$10,000 damage suit for malpractice against two doctors. The jury was out about 40 hours. The foreman said the jury simply couldn't agree.

Rev. Dr. Eugene Daniel preached his annual sermon in his church, the First Presbyterian. He said the congregation had given during the year \$9,400, and during the past five years \$42,000.

Governor Aycock's next address will be at Statesville, Monday, and next after that New York, May 20th, before the North Carolina Society.

New York, May 6.—The joint committee of the chamber of commerce and the Merchants' Association in reference to Jacksonville, today authorized the purchase of supplies, amounting \$20,000 and ordered them sent South as fast as they could be shipped.

Transatlantic Resuming Work.

LONDON, May 6.—Mr. Chamberlain the Colonial Secretary, informed a committee of the House of Commons today that the gold had been produced in the Transatlantic since January 1, and 20 steamer started May 4, and a hundred steamer started today.

Scientist Contracts Cancer.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—Dr. Joe Eison, the California scientist, whose discovery of the cancer germ was a notable event in the medical history of last year, has been attacked by cancer. He has submitted to an operation at St. Luke's Hospital, and the surgeons say that he is rapidly recovering, but as yet nothing has been determined about the final results. Dr. Eison believes that he became inoculated with the cancer microbe while studying the germs through the microscope.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.

RALEIGH, May 7.—The crop bulletin for week ending Monday, May 6, is as follows:

Very decided improvement in crop conditions occurred during the past week. Clear skies and warm, dry weather gave an impetus to farm work of all kinds, and rapidly advanced the growth of vegetation, which now appears green and vigorous. The change to summer-like conditions was very sudden; midday temperatures during the entire week have been quite high, reaching a maximum of 94 degrees on May 3d, and although the nights have continued comparatively cool, especially in the more elevated western region, the mean temperature was 5 degrees above the daily normal. Every day was bright and sunny. There was no rainfall anywhere during the week except a very small amount (0.25) at Weldon and traces at a few other points. Warm showers are much needed to soften the soil and would greatly benefit vegetation.

Farm work was pushed rapidly during every day of the week. Planting corn is approaching completion except in the western part, early planted corn is up so poorly that a large amount of replanting was necessary. In general the stand of corn is poor, but the young plants have improved in color. Planting cotton is now progressing actively, and is nearly finished in most sections and many southern counties. Almost all the land that needed to be cottoned has been replanted and planted over. Cotton is coming up slowly, and needs warm showers to promote germination and growth. Some sections have been planted ground for tobacco. It being prepared, and transplanting will begin in about a week. At short intervals tobacco plants have grown actively, but are about 12 days late.

Trout crops are now growing slowly, and shipment of most of the early catches are beginning. Late catches with potatoes are doing well. The stand of early potatoes is poor. Large quantities of watermelons are being raised, but the crop is late and small. Almost all watermelons raised that the prospect for fruit is still very poor. Apples are showing in the various western counties with a good stand.
