INVALID.

Revenue Act Passed Only One Reading in Senate.

President of Senate Explains The Reason. It May Partially Hold. Mann Favors Keeping up one Farm.

RALEIGH, May 8.—The statement comes from leading lawyers at Wilmington that the revenue act of 1901 passed only one reading in the Senate, and is hence invalid.

Your correspondent today interviewed Lt. Gov. W. D. Turner, president of the Senate, who said: "It is a fact. I called attention to the matter at the time. Here are the facts in the case. In the Senate the bill passed at its second and third readings by an aye and no vote, after the second reading 48 amendments having been put on. The bill as amended went back to the house for concurrence. The house declined to concur. A committee of conference was appointed. This recommended that the house concur in 30 of the Senate amendments and that the Senate recede from 7. The report was adopted. My view was that the amendments were so material as to make it necessary that they should pass their readings by an aye or no vote on three separate days. I called the attention of a Senator to this. It was next to the last day. Members were anxious to get away. So nothing was done."

"The questions involved are two in number, 1st whether the amendments were such material alterations as to make it necessary for them to pass their several readings, by aye and no vote, on different days. 2nd whether the bill will stand as it passed the house, thus leaving out all the Senate amendments or whether it will stand as ratified. If it stands as it passed the house then the taxes will be much higher, as the Senate amendments were conservative. So what has the public to gain by fighting it as ratified? In my opinion the failure to properly adopt the Senate amendments, if there was failure under the provisions of the constitution (that is if the amendments were such material changes as to make the three voting necessary) does not destroy the whole bill. This is my private view. It will be contended, no doubt that the amendments were not such as to material alterations as to require aye and no vote on different days. What will the public gain by making the faint on the other side?"
