MARY. The general feeling among the voters of New Bern is to declare all primary elections as entirely superfinous.

A few weeks ago there was a primary held in this city, at which the voters were given the opportunity to declare their preferences for Mayor, Chief of Police and Aldermon.

Last Tuesday, the regular election of Aldermen for the City of New Bern took place, the candidatos, with the ex-ception of probably those in two wards, being the men named at the primary election.

As the Aldermen elect the Mayor and Chief of Police the names of these candidates do not appear at the regular election.

At the primary election, which was not legal in any way, there was a big vote polled, with plenty of excitement during the day.

luring the day. At the regular election, last Tuesday, the vote was small and very little interest exhibited.

And yet here were two elections, the first not legalized, at which all was ex-citement, with really no special scrutiny of the voter who presented himself at the polls to cast his ballot; the second, legal, very quiet, at which every voter was closely examined as to his right to

But the non-legalized election really elected the candidates, the regular election simply confirming the vote of an election which every one agrees is not legal or binding.

Of course it is a pretty sentiment, which might be ealogized, that of accepting and abiding by the vote of the primary, but for practical purposes why should there be two elections, or rather what is the necessity of having a primary election, not legalized, to procede a regular election f






