AN OPINION.

Governor Aycock on the Status of The Revenue Act.

Memorial Day at the Capital a Notable One. Flag of the 26th Regiment. The Text Books. Criticism of Aycock.

RALEIGH, May 9.—Gov. Aycock was asked by your correspondent today for his view as to the new revenue act. The Governor said in reply: "I have no sort of doubt that the act is all right. This is my offhand opinion, but I am sure of my ground. My belief is that even though the facts be as stated, the courts will hold it to be a valid law if it comes before them. If they do not then there never has been a valid law since the constitution was adopted. In 1900, and no valid act by congress has been passed raising revenue. The conditions, article 2, section 26, requires all bills and resolutions of a legislative nature shall be read three times in each house before they pass into laws. There is scarcely a law on the statute books which was not amended on 2d or 3d reading in vital points. If these three several readings have to be had after amendments then there is scarcely any law which properly passed. If the decision of the Supreme Court in the 19th reports is law then almost no statute has been properly passed. Almost any law is amended on 2d or 3d reading and the amendments are not read 3 times, not have they ever been."

The fact is that the opinion of the court in the 19th is a dictum.

Arrangements are completed for a notably good observance of Memorial Day here tomorrow. One of the features will be the presence of the flag of the 26th regiment (Vance, Burgwyn, and Lane's). It is the property of E. C. Duncan, to whom it was given by sergeant Shackelford, his uncle who was the color-bearer. Lt. Col. Allen of this regiment, who lives at Holly Springs, this county, will be here. The flag is to be placed in the "Hall of History" in the State Museum. The 26th suffered a greater loss than any other regiment, on either side, in the Civil war.

Some of the cotton mill owners are sorry the strike did not materialize. They would like to have some ground for shutting down.

This morning the State text book commission completed the work of having the arguments of the book agents. In Aycock's mind the arguments were fine and he greatly enjoyed hearing them. Gen. Toon expressed the same opinion. It was easy in the argument to tell which of the speakers were a teacher and which a politician. Mr. Wheeler of Chicago made a most fearful speech. He is a teacher. Many very prominent North Carolinians are in the employment of book companies. The number of book agent here yesterday and today was the largest ever in North Carolina at once.

There is some criticism of Gov. Aycock's pardons. There is nothing secret about pardons now. What is done is given out and the reason for doing it. Then too, he differs from other governors as to the class of pardons, many being from jails. Most prisoners are in jails, and most meritorious cases are in jails.

Federal Prisoners Transferred.

RALEIGH, May 9.—Four Federal prisoners were taken from here today to the Penitentiary at Nashville. They are "Dr." H. T. Allen of Robinson and Alexander of Chowan, twindlers; Jesse Wall, negro, who only a few months ago was released from Nashville penitentiary and who goes back for retelling whiskey without license, and a negro from New Bern who impersonated an uncle and drew pension.

County Commissioners Proceedings.

The Board met at the Court house in New Bern on the 9th day of May 1901. It being the regular meeting of said board.

Present Commissioners, Jones, Baxter, Fulcher, Wood and Wadsworth.

Mr. R. P. Williams appeared before the board and asked the aid of the county in support of Saille Brinson, which on motion of commissioner Fulcher was allowed to the amount of \$1.50 per month.

Ordered that the allowance to Haywood Moore, a blind man at Cove, be continued and F. D. Avery be so notified.

Whereas the General Assembly on the 13th day of March 1901 ratified on act relating to highways, public roads, bridges and ferries; and providing that the said act shall not be operative in the counties unless approved by the Board of Commissioners of the various counties, and whereas we regard the provisions of said act as wise and beneficial and believe that they will effect an improvement in said highways, roads, bridges, ferries, ferries; there be it resolved that the Board of Commissioners of Craven county hereby approve and adopt the provision of said act and declare the same in full force and effect in Craven county, all commissioners voting for same.

Ordered that the tax list be corrected in regard to list of Geo N. Ennett, which shows an error of personal property.

John R. Dixon presented his bill for repairs to fence in No 1 township to the amount of \$9.78 which, on motion, was allowed.

F. C. Nelson presented his bill for work on fence in No 1 township for \$10.34 which was allowed.

Ordered that Haywood Rhodes be and is hereby relieved of poll tax on account of infirmity and disability.

Ordered that L. J. Taylor be permitted to pay the additional tax necessary in order to sell beer.

J. T. House was appointed list taker for No 9 township in place of O. H. Perry resigned.

Ordered by the Board that the property heretofore listed to Wright Rita, situated in the city of New Bern, deed to same being recorded book 93 folio 161 being listed in the name of Matilda Rita for the years 1898-99 and 1900 on the list of 1900 on account of error.

Ordered that items under head of whiskey and bicycles listed to Sam'l Kilpatrick in 9th township be stricken from the list on account of error and charge to the proper party.

Ordered by the Board that K. R. Jones chairman of the Board is hereby authorized to verify the answer in that certain action in the Superior Court of Craven County entitled, J. F. Rosen against Board of Commissioners.

Board took recess until 3 o'clock p. m.

The Board together with Drs. Chas. Duffy and F. W. Hughes met as Craven county sanitary committee in accordance with an act of the General Assembly passed at the session of 1901 for the purpose of electing a Superintendent of Health and other matters which may come before them.

Present Commissioners, Jones, Fulcher, Wood, Wadsworth and Baxter, and Dr. Chas. Duffy, and Dr. F. W. Hughes.

The Board went into the election of Superintendent of Health, Dr. H. D. V. Jones was placed in nomination by Dr. F. W. Hughes; Dr. N. H. Street, by Commissioner J. J. Baxter, and Dr. Leinster Duffy by Dr. Chas. Duffy. A ballot being taken it was found that Dr. Jones had received 3 votes, Dr. Street 4 votes, and Dr. Leinster Duffy, 1 vote. No election being had the Board proceeded to ballot again. The second ballot resulted as the first and a ball being taken with the same result. The Board then balloted the fourth time, upon the count of which it was found that Dr. N. H. Street had received 3 votes and Dr. H. D. V. Jones, 3 votes. Whereupon Dr. N. H. Street was declared duly elected Superintendent of Health for the ensuing term.

Ordered by the County Sanitary Committee that it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to sell after the 15th day of May 1901 to dump or deposit any of the refuse or animal or vegetable matter of the City on any lot or in any of the docks around the City of New Bern. Any person or persons violating this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall not exceeding \$50 or imprisonment not exceeding 30 days.

Commissioners Jones, Fulcher, Wood,

Wadsworth, Baxter, Dr. Chas. Duffy and F. W. Hughes, voting for same.

Ordered that the salary of the Supt. of Health remain as heretofore to wit \$300, per annum payable monthly. In case of any epidemic extra compensation to be allowed for extra services rendered. Said extra compensation not to exceed \$300, per month.

On motion Sanitary Board adjourned at the call of the Chairman.

Board of Commissioners met pursuant to recess.

Present Commissioners, Jones, Fulcher, Wood, Wadsworth and Baxter.

Ordered that Eliza Blount's allowance be increased to 2.00 per month.

On motion Board took recess until 10 o'clock a. m. May 7th 1901.

The Board met at 10:30 a. m. May 7th 1901 pursuant to recess.

Present Commissioners, Jones, Baxter, Wood, Fulcher and Wadsworth.

On motion Mrs. H. J. Howard was permitted to list her personal property, she having failed to give in same at proper time.

On motion the real property of Mrs. H. J. Howard was ordered placed upon the regular list and stricken from the delinquent list.

Ordered that property listed to G. H. Forsythe be reduced from \$3500 to \$3000.

Ordered that property of J. H. Hudson in No. 6 township purchased from L. H. Cooter be reduced to \$36.

The Board proceeded to draw a jury to serve at the term of Superior Court on the Twelfth Monday after the first Monday in March. It being the 27th day of May 1901.
