No Suit as Yet Against Martin's Bondsmen.

Only 49 Sheriffs Have Made Full Settlements. Three Cases Small Pox Among Negroes at Oberlin. Mrs. Swepson's Bequests.

Raleigh, N. C., May 18.—As yet no suit has been brought upon the bonds given by W. H. Martin, the defaulting ex-clerk in the State treasury. Ex-treasurer Worth, when asked why no suit had been brought replied that it was because no report had yet been filed by the legislative committee. It seems that this report is being waited for. Up to this date 49 of the 97 sheriffs have made complete settlements of taxes due the State for last year. Nothing has been heard for some time regarding the alleged discovery that the last revenue act was of no effect because its amendments had not been voted on three several times. It was a short-lived sensation.

The corporation commission devoted several hours today to a conference with the list takers and assessors of this county, at which the latter were fully instructed regarding their duties under the new revenue act.

The commencement exercises of the State Normal and Industrial College at Greensboro began today, with the Alumnae reunion and banquet. Several Raleigh people are attending.

Mrs. Aycock will receive at the executive mansion Tuesday afternoon, in compliment to her sister, Mrs. Anderson of Wilson.

One of the matters most talked of among the farmers now is the exceeding lateness of the crops. Some of them are this early predicting that it will be a bad crop year.

Three cases of smallpox have been found among negroes in Oberlin, and the sick have been taken to the pest house. A white man in west Raleigh is quarantined and under guard in his house and his store has been closed.

About \$30,000 has to this date been raised for the Methodist orphanage here.

July 8th Raleigh people are to vote on the issue of \$100,000 of street improvement bonds. It is said hardly any votes will be cast in opposition to the issue.

As stated last night the late Mrs. Swepson of Raleigh bequeathed the Baptist Female University here \$3000. It is also to get a third of the residue of her estate after the various bequests are paid. It is said the residue will approximate \$60,000, and if correct this will give the University \$30,000 more. Wake Forest college by bequest or as its part of the residue will get something like \$17,000.

Death of Capt. James Evans. CHARLESTON, S. C., May 17.—Captain James Evans, one of the oldest pilots at this port and a survivor of the Confederate cruiser Alabama, died at his home here today. He was an experienced navigator, and while serving on the Sumter and afterwards on the Alabama under Admiral Semmes, one of his chief duties was to give in advance the nationality of any approaching vessel. Both Admiral Semmes and Lieutenant Mackay, in their published works refer to Evans' naval services. He was one of the officers picked up by the English yacht Thetis off Cherbourg when the Alabama was sunk by the Kearsarge. He returned to the Confederacy and was serving as one of the naval batteries on the James river when Richmond was evacuated.

ALBANY STRIKE ENDED.

Settlement Effected Between Car Company and Employees. Special to Journal.

Albany, N. Y., May 18.—The strike of the United Traction employees ended today, a settlement being arranged between the Company and its employees.

All the street car lines were in operation at noon.

Albany, N. Y., May 17.—Two dead one dying and sixteen suffering from injuries more or less severe, is the record today of the casualties resulting from the strike of United Traction Company employees in this city. Of the three men who were wounded by the fire of the national guardmen yesterday William Walsh and Leroy Smith are well, while William Rooney's wound is not dangerous. William Marshall, the non-union motorman, whose skull was fractured by stones thrown by the mob that attacked a car he was taking out of the barn Tuesday, cannot recover. Mr. Smith died this morning. He is prominent in business and social life here and was the presiding officer at the last session of the American Whist Congress.

A drenching rain succeeding a warm humid day, made it unpleasant for the military guarding the city tonight, but had the effect of clearing the street corners of crowds.

There was no repetition today of the scenes of disorder and turbulence that have marked the other days of the strike. There was the same imposing show of military strength and in afternoon 600 additional troops of the Ninth Regiment of New York, were added to the already large force now on duty here. Two companies were called into the general assistance of a settlement of the strike and the other feeling of anxiety that suggested the ages and indignation were the striking of William Walsh and Leroy Smith.
