If every young man should lay aside the pursuit of knowledge, as gained through public school and college, and go out into the world to seek only the dollar, the successful once at the very most must be limited.

But in the pursuit of knowledge, however severe the course of study may be, there is success for all. It may not be that the student will be able to satisfy his gross nature as Mr. Schwab can, through the ability of his dollar, but the student can see and enjoy a thousand things in life, which are invisible to Mr. Schwab, pleasures which his dollar cannot give.

If education and its value to every one was not so imperishably fastened upon the people of this country, there might be much barm done by such public talks and to warm and sweeten the stomaci tle education av possible for business

What is needed today, is not such public advocates of the virture of the dollar maker, but advocates of education, and the value of lives which are not given for self alone, as is the money maker's.

Mr. Schwab may imagine that the virtue of money making, and its success, makes him an authority, and a safe adviser of the youth of the country. As to money getting, he may be an authority in his own line, but could another person, to say nothing of the thousands he would influence, follow his methods to the same success ?

Mr. Schwab exhibits himself as inished artist in dollar getting, but as an adviser of the youth, proves by his talk to know nothing of the real value of life, its aims, hopes or possi-

The schools and public buildings are equally frigid.

"It seemed to me that the only warn bings in Japan were the bables, who looked like bundles of gayly colored crape, their round heads covered by knit caps. They slumber peacefully tucked down their mothers' backs. The attempt to keep warm in winter is not entirely a 'modern improvement,' though t goes with western civilization. The Koreans do it very thoroughly, the Chinese to a certain extent. The Japanese, as a race, continue to scorn it as they always have done, and this is merely one of a hundred examples which prove that the Japanese are still true to theh traditions in their daily life and as yet little affected in the ordering of their nomes by the ideas adopted from the west."

NOVEL CURES.

Unique Methods Employed to Overcome Certain Diseases.

Freezing, baking, illuminating, toruring, frightening and bruising are among the accepted ways of curing certain diseases, says a writer in the Philadelphia Times. For example, the baking cure: When one has a well developed rhenmatism, he is placed in a specles of stove and the crystals of uric acid are literally melted out of his body. Another odd cure once tried for rheumatism was burial in damp, warm clay. The first rheumatic burial

took place at Menominee, Mich. The treatment was not a success, and this form of cure has been given up. The freezing cure: This was first introduced by a Swiss doctor, Paul Burdevropt. He placed his patients in sheets immersed in ice water, packing the patient all about with crushed ice

This treatment is today used in typhoid Or the patient is plunged into an ice water bath. The treatment saves many lves. Raging fever above 105 degrees F. has been brought down by these means to normal-98 2-5 degrees-in

Neither of these modes of treatmen actually freezes one. A physician of Paris, M. Figenu, introduced in 1890 an ammonia vapor method, which really from the patient. The body was placed in a chamber into which certain chem teals were introduced. Ammonia gar by sudden evaporation, then produced stense cold, and the blood in the bedy fost most of its beat.

M. Figenu's method did not meet with success. Some of his patients succumbed to the drastic measure and the practice was abandoned.

The Whrel Problem. Which, at any given moment, is move

ing forward faster—the top of a coach wheel or the bottom? The answer to this question seem simple enough, but probably nine per sons out of ten, asked at random rould give the wrong reply. It would appear at first sight that the top and bottom must be moving at the same rate—that is, the speed of the carriage. But by a little thought it will be dis-covered that the bottom of the wheel is in fact, by the direction of its motion around its axia, moving backwar in an opposite direction to that which the carriage is advancing and is conesqueptly stationary in space, white the point on top of the wheel is mov-ing forward with the double velocity of its own metion around the axis and the speed at which the carriage moves.
