RALEIGH.

Threatening Condition Among the S. A. L. Machinists.

Satisfaction Under New Law. 465 inmates in Insane Asylum. Option on State Swamp Lands Null and Void. Board Examiners.

RALEIGH, June 11.—The auditor says that the corporations in the State are reporting satisfactorily and rapidly under the new law and the building and loan associations are also reporting promptly.

State Treasurer Lay says he and all the other State officers thought they ought to pay income tax on salaries, but that the attorney general could find no law for it.

There are now 465 inmates of the insane asylum here. This is the largest number it has ever had.

The State superintendent of public instruction left this afternoon for Wrightsville, where he will on Thursday deliver an address to the Teachers' Assembly. His secretary, John W. Duckett, goes to Kittrell tomorrow to deliver an address to the State association of colored teachers.

The board of education elects M. C. S. Noble, of the State University; S. L. Sheep of Elizabeth city, president of the North Carolina Association of Academy and W. J. Ferrell of Wadesboro, a State board of public school examiners. Noble was reelected. The two others are new men.

To day there was a hearing before a magistrate of the case of three of the men brought here to take the places of the striking machinists, the charge being that they stole three valises full of clothing belonging to women in a disorderly house to which they were taken Saturday night by strikers or strike sympathizers. There are statements and counter-statements as to the matter, on the one hand it is said that the men did the stealing; on the other that it was a plan to drive them out of the town. One of the new men was assaulted last night by strike sympathizers. This is Raleigh's first strike. There is no popular interest in it, for one side or the other. On the streets nothing is heard about it. One of the strikers declared that the assault of the new man was by "town boys." Thirty-nine witnesses were summoned by the S. A. L. railway as witnesses in the larceny case, those all being striking machinists. Three or four of the latter have been away from here some days; to get work elsewhere it is said.

The State Board of Education declares the office which the Prison Board gave K. S. Finch on the State swamp lands to be null and void.

Not a Working Day.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Sunday is not a working day in the Government service. In an opinion rendered today by Judge Advocate-General Lemly, which received the approval of Secretary Long, the Navy Department adopted the position that the general policy of the Government is opposed to the performance of work on the first day of the week unless absolutely necessary.

The question arose in consequence of a provision of law enacted during the past session, authorizing persons employed at navy yards to have leave of absence each year for 15 "working days." Under the opinion of Captain Lemly, each employe will have a total leave annually of 17 days, including two Sundays.

WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN

Reports More Favorable for Farm Work and Growth of Crops.

RALEIGH, March 11.—The government's weekly crop and weather bulletin for the week ended last night, issued today, says:

All reports indicate that the past week has been very favorable both for farm work and for the growth of crops. The temperature averaged about normal and the days were generally warm without extremes, but cool nights prevailed toward the close of the week. The light showers which were quite general about the 7th or 7th were very beneficial, softening the soil which had begun to be hard to work. The amount of sunshine was abundant. Farmers took advantage of these favorable conditions to push work as much as possible; many fields have been cleaned of grass and are well cultivated, but the amount of work to be done was so great that grass has not all been subdued, and another week of fair weather is required. Crops still average from two to three weeks late, but have made considerable growth and renewed vigor.

Chopping cotton progressed very rapidly, but is not yet finished. Where fields have been cleaned the crops show good stand and better color, but large areas are still very grassy, and some fields have been abandoned or will be plowed up for corn. Cotton seems to be about the smallest for the season on record. Corn is doing fairly well and has regained color where cultivated; grassy fields show little growth, yellow color, and very poor stands. Much corn was planted in lowlands throughout the State during this week. The bulk of the tobacco crop has now been transplanted, and the crop is starting off well with good stands. Wheat and winter oats are ripening rapidly; cutting has begun in the south, and the harvest will become general next week, averaging ten days late. There is much complaint of scab and rust, but the damage is not wide spread enough to materially lessen the favorable outlook for all the cereals. Spring oats are very fine. Gardens and vegetables have improved. Digging Irish potatoes has commenced, and shipments are going forward from eastern sections. Rice has a good stand and looks well. While most fruits promise fair yields, it appears that the apple crop will be almost a failure, on account of the fruit falling from the trees.

PENSIONERS INCREASE.

Auditor Thinks Number Will be 10,000 This Year.

RALEIGH, June 11.—The State Auditor was specially interviewed today regarding pensioners. He said: "Twice as many blanks for applicants has been sent out. Yet there are requests for more. There are now 6,000 pensioners. I believe there will be 10,000 this year. The increase will be of soldiers. All the widows who can get on the list are now there and of course some will be dropped under the new law, as under this they must have been married prior to April 1, 1865. Great as the increase in soldier pensioners will be, it will be larger next year, as the information as to the new law will not spread through the outlying districts. The county boards will go over the lists. Then they go before the State pension board. It is a great task to review the 10,000 applications."

America Will Keep Out.

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The United States Government has formally communicated to the foreign powers the impossibility of taking part in a joint guarantee for the payment of the Chinese indemnity.

The difficulties in the way of such an arrangement are set forth in the communication, particularly those relating to the constitutional restrictions on the President in making a joint guarantee of this character.

In view of the determination of the United States not to be a party to such a guarantee, anxiety is shown in diplomatic circles as to the outcome on the question of indemnities. One view is that a majority of the powers, being favorable to a joint guarantee, will execute this instrument and thereafter carry on a concert of their own. In that event, it is said, the United States would arrange directly with China as to the American portion of the indemnity.

The representatives of most of the European powers do not believe that a resort to The Hague tribunal, as proposed by the United States, will be acceptable to their governments.

County Without Population.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—A curious observation has been made in the Census Bureau. There are no population returns from Dawson county, Texas, which is in the stacked plain. In the northwest part of the state, near the border of New Mexico. There was only one small town in that county, with the big name of Chicago, but that is understood to have been wiped out by a cyclone.

Present is therefore officially without inhabitants—whether it is actually so, and how many it once was, having to wait until the next census returns in the fall.
