## RALEIGH.

### Removal of Old Arsenal From Capitol Square.

### General Cox Honored. Church Donation to Hospital. State Charter. Base Ball. Impeachment Trial Report.

RALEIGH, June 13.—Col. W. B. Rodman of Washington, commanding the 2nd regiment, State Guard, is here. He says he will take a fine regiment to camp. He says northeastern North Carolina is yet suffering greatly from excessive rains, which prevailed last week and this week.

Gen. W. R. Cox, president of the State Fair, is here on business concerning that. He had a letter today from the Association which has in charge Fort Stevens national military park, in the environs of Washington, D. C., and is made a member of the association, which is to mark the further advance of the Confederates upon Washington. Gen. Cox said this was because his brigade went nearer than any other troops in the assault upon Fort Stevens.

The manager of the Wilmington base ball team says he feels sure that team has the pennant. Ten straight games were played here, ending yesterday and Raleigh won four of them, yet playing great ball all the while.

Edenton Street M. E. Church here gives \$400 purse to the Methodist hospital here. It had already given four or five times that amount.

In the secretary of State's office today the officials laughed at some of the newspapers for printing today the granting of a charter to the Winston-Madison railway. The charter was granted 8 weeks ago and the facts were all published then.

The State charters the W. T. Mason Lumber Company, of Whitler, Jackson county, capital \$75,000. W. T. Mason of Asheville and E. H. Hale of Indianapolis being the principal stockholders.

The legislative committee which is here to pass upon the claims filed by the late Fuson oyster inspector, Theophilus White, which claims were turned down by the new Democratic administration, got at work today. The committee said the claims approximated about \$8,000, but the State Auditor says those filed in his office amount to only \$1,300.

It is said at the office of the Secretary of State that the impeachment trial in the case of Judges Furches and Douglas will probably be in print August 1. There are many enquiries for the report.

Governor Aycock and the Council of State are yet at work on the matter of removing the arsenal from the Capitol Square. A proposition is made to remove it for the material, but the man who makes the proposal does not wish to put down curbing and jail on the site.

Nine young ladies wrote up yesterday's base ball game for a local paper, each describing an inning. The work was very cleverly done and is a new feature in this line of reporting.

### Strikes Delay Warships.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Practically every private shipyard having Government contracts for the construction of warships is feeling the strike of machinists, and at several of the leading concerns all work has ceased in the mechanical departments on both private and public contracts.

No penalties can be imposed for failure to complete vessels within contract time, owing to a provision in all agreements relieving firms from such imposition when strikes interfere with work. The effect, however, will be to cause some question as to the advisability of making further appropriations for an increase of the navy until the large program now in course of construction has been completed or well toward completion.

### Virginians Opened Eyes at Buffalo.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 13.—The cadets from the Virginia Polytechnic Institute left for home tonight. ### Strike Situation Critical.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., June 13.—The situation in Newport News has reached a critical stage. In addition to the striking machinists, about 500 in number, 200 skilled men from the electrical plumbing and pipe-fitting departments were laid off yesterday. Today 150 more chiefly laborers, were laid off. In each case action was due to the interference in the progress of the work of the departments by the strikers. It is stated that men in other departments will be laid off as rapidly as they finish their work ahead of the machinists and can do no more without aid of the machine shops. At the present rate the yard will close down in a week or ten days, unless there is a change.

### Americans Beat British Marksman.

LONDON, June 13.—The International Clay-pit trap shooting match which was begun yesterday on the grounds of the Middlesex Gun Club, Hendon, was resumed under entirely different weather conditions today. Rain with varying winds, fell during the early afternoon, making shooting extremely difficult. The match closed for the day in a driving rain with the following totals, Americans 887, British 724.

### The New Sea Fighters.

BOSTON, Mass., June 13.—With the proud distinction of being the fastest battleship in America and the speediest of her class in the world the new era fighter Illinois lies at anchor in President's Roads tonight after a most successful trial. Over the governmental course from Cape Ann to Cape Porpoise and return, a distance of 60 nautical miles, she roused today under the watchful eyes of United States naval representatives and established a new record by maintaining an average speed of 17.21 knots for four consecutive hours.

### Besieged by Nobby Britons.

LONDON, June 13.—Prior to his departure from London for Liverpool today, where he embarked on the White Star steamer Oceanic, bound for New York, Morris E. Jessup, president of the Chamber of Commerce, was interviewed by the Westminster Gazette.

Mr. Jessup expressed delight at the reception of the delegation from the New York Chamber of Commerce and said the only thing which caused any uneasiness arose from describing them as "millionaires." With the exception of Messrs. Carnegie and Morgan, he declared, it was doubtful if there was a single millionaire in the delegation. As a result of this misrepresentation, Mr. Jessup said, the representatives of the New York Chamber of Commerce were viewed with suspicion and called "millionaires" by British nobles with American dollars.
