RALEIGH.

Not One Half Blind Children of State at School.

Sell Survey Work. Arithmetical Adopted. Strikers in Want. Waddell Case to be Heard. Large State Delegation to Epworth League Meeting.

RALEIGH, June 19.—There are 235 blind in the State Institution here. The principal had a list with the names of 100 others not pupils. Today he received from the census bureau a list of 189 whose names were not on his list. Unfortunately there is no law to compel the attendance of these blind at the institution. The legislature lack the moral courage to enact a law to enforce attendance, just as they lack it to enforce a dog law. So there are not half the blind children in the State at school.

The soil survey work by the government and the State jointly was begun at Burlington today and it is to cover all of Alamance county.

The Milnes' arithmetical which were yesterday adopted for the entire State, in the public schools, by the text book commission, have for some time been in use in nearly all the city public schools.

Yesterday three of the men brought here to take the places of Seaboard Air Line strikers called on Gov. Aycock. A striker was with them. The men told the Governor they had quit work and had no money and that for 24 hours they had had no food. The Governor raised three dollars for them and gave it to the striker telling him to buy food for them.

The return of sunshine is hailed with joy by the wheat growers. Cutting began by the rains, and there is also a good deal of rust.

The State will be represented by a large delegation at the Epworth League convention at San Francisco. Over twenty well-known Methodist ministers will go.

Governor Aycock's address at Wilkesboro this evening was on educational lines.

The report of the status of the penitentiary's finances will appear in thirty days or less. Governor Aycock has called for it. The report will show the status December 31st, 1900, and March 15th, 1901.

Friday, there will be a hearing here of the case of A. M. Waddell, who was brought here from Fayetteville, charged with aiding T. B. Tyson, formerly of Fayetteville, now in jail here, in the scheme by which a Virginia life insurance company was defrauded out of the insurance on Mrs. Tyson's life. Waddell says others are concerned in the frauds. Mrs. Tyson is his sister. She is at Fayetteville. The abandoned woman whom Tyson was with is at Henderson. It is a very outrageous case.

Prey to Fire and Thieves.

GARRETTVILLE, O. C., June 18.—Early this morning a fire which started in a bakery destroyed almost an entire business block in this place, and for a time threatened the whole business section. It caused a loss estimated at \$50,000. A great deal of goods was removed from the burned buildings and those adjacent, and to put a stop to extensive looting the local military company and the full police force was on duty, but even these were unable to stop the depredations. The losses are as follows: Bestie Building, valued at \$50,000, insurance \$15,000, and \$15,000 to stock of several firms.

James McPherson owned three adjoining buildings which were consumed with a loss of \$6,000 on contents.

Mrs. McKinley Out of Danger.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—Doctors Johnston and Hays held a consultation at the White House today, at the conclusion of which Dr. Johnston pronounced Mrs. McKinley out of danger and convalescing. Dr. Hays, leaving the White House at 10:30 last night, said: "Mrs. McKinley is getting along very slowly, the weakness to improve. She set up today about two hours and saw several friends."

FOUND \$30,000 IN GOLD.

But It Took a Clairvoyant and a Hypnotist to Locate It.

SAVANNAH, Ga., June 18.—A special from Statesboro, Ga., to the Morning News says: "W. W. Brannen, of this place, is \$30,000 better off today than he was two days ago. He is a farmer. Some months ago he was in Savannah, and out of curiosity visited a clairvoyant and had his fortune told. The fortune-teller informed him with much impressiveness that he would shortly discover gold on his farm. He laughed at the idea.

"Later he dreamed about the gold for several nights, and after a time consented to allow a hypnotist to put one of his small children, a girl of ten years, under his spell. The child described a pot of gold at the end of an old mill dam. Mr. Brannen then began to dig and at the end of three weeks had an excavation big enough for the foundation of a modern home. Yesterday morning he struck an old iron pot. On uncovering it he found in contained about \$30,000 in gold coins of dates anterior to the Civil War. There is no indication of the person who buried it."

LONDON, June 18.—Former Governor Hazen B. Pingree, of Michigan, died at 11:35 o'clock tonight. His son was the only person present. The body will be taken home. The fatal disease was a cancerous affection of the intestines.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, June 18.—The War Office authorities have decided to construct an additional fortification in Kingston harbor, with a battery of modern quick-firing guns.

A naval director of works is now here preparing plans and estimates for the construction of a floating dock and for the improvement of the dockyard.

ALABAMA'S CONVENTION.

Establishment of Whipping-Post Among The Suggestions.

MONTGOMERY, ALA., June 18.—Among the ordinances introduced in the Constitutional Convention to day was one by Delegate Williams, of Marengo, to establish a whipping post; by Delegate Pettus, of Limestone, to prevent miscegenation; by Delegate Cofer, of Calhoun, to elect solicitors by vote of the people and fixing the salary at \$2,000 instead of \$3,500 as now, and by Delegate Groer, of Calhoun, fixing all municipal elections on the same day as State elections.

Consideration of the report of the committee of the executive department was resumed and consumed the entire morning session.

Rains Hurt Cotton in the Carolinas.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—The Weather Bureau's weekly summary of crop conditions says: In the central and western portions of the cotton belt cotton is generally improved and well cultivated although in need of rain in some sections. In the Carolinas, Georgia and Florida heavy rains have caused much damage and the crop is greatly in need of cultivation.

Transplanting tobacco is practically finished in Kentucky, Virginia and Maryland, and is well advanced in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana, the general outlook being encouraging, although worms are proving destructive in the Carolinas. In the States of the Missouri valley the falling of apples continues to be extensively reported. The general outlook for other fruits is encouraging, although the rains in Georgia have caused rotting to more or less extent.

Running Fight With Mexicans.

LEWIS, Texas, June 18.—News by wire has just reached here that Captain Brooks's company of State rangers had a fight with the Mexicans, who are supposed to be guilty of the assassination of Sheriff Morris, of Karnes county, and Sheriff Glover and Constable Schaefer, of Guadalupe county. The commander of the company was wired that four horses were stolen Sunday night at Campbellton, in Atascosa county, and that the riders were headed for the Rio Grande.

Brooks's company were at once put on the lookout, and the information tonight is to the effect that the detachment overtook four Mexicans riding horses that suited the description of those stolen at Campbellton from the Rio Grande, which is about eighty miles from here. A running fight ensued, in which one Mexican was killed, one captured and two escaped. Captain Brodie and party are in pursuit.

NEW THIRD PARTY.

Populist and Silver Republicans. All Voters Favoring Reform Asked to Join.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 18.—Definite steps toward the organization of a new "third party," which is proposed to embrace Missouri and to form the nucleus for a national growth were taken today in Kansas City at a conference of members of the Populist State committee and a few Silver Republicans. The movement is said to have the expressed sympathy for, if not the avowed support of, Wm. J. Bryan, who, it is further hinted, is to be the new party's candidate for President in 1904.

Lee Meriwether, of St. Louis, and 23 other leaders in the public ownership party of St. Louis, arrived in Kansas City during the morning, after having spent the whole of yesterday in consultation with Mr. Bryan at Lincoln. They are guarded in statements concerning Mr. Bryan, but say if the latter does not support the present movement he is, at any rate, in sympathy with its purpose. Today's conference was secret. It will be continued tomorrow and end with a public meeting when the result of the gathering will be embodied in an address.

The meeting was first suggested by Mr. Cook, in a circular letter asking a conference with the Silver Republicans and the Public Ownership party leaders. In response to this, Lee Meriwether issued a call for the meeting to-day to the men of his party and J. W. Foster, of St. Joseph, issued a similar call to the Silver Republicans. The conference was to include middle-of-the-road Populists and all Democrats and Republicans who might sympathize with the reform movement.
