AFTER THE BATTLE.

VETERAN'S STORY OF A TABSELED

"Whenever I see a tumeled Turkish fee," said a Confederate veteran whose attention had been attracted by a mosking cap of that pattern in a Canal street window, "I am reminded of a curious and rather grewsome incident of my campaigning days. It was on the morning after the second battle of L'anassas," he continued in response to a request for the story. "and several of us from my company had gone over to the field in the hope of picking up a few things that we badly needed and -waterproofs, for instance, and sound

"During the previous day's engage ment you may remember that a regi-ment of freshly recruited New York were charged and almost annihilated by Hood's brigade. They were mowed down like ripened grain and fell s thickly that their corpses literally car-peted the earth. I dare say it was as awful a slaughter, considering the number engaged, as occurred anywhere in the course of the war.

"Well, we hadn't gone very far when we came to this hill and began to get among the dead men. The poor fellows had been mustered into service les than a week hefore and they were said to be the most gorgeously uniformed military troop ever organized. They wore scarlet Turkish trousers, blue Jackets embroidered with gold buillor braid and purple fezes with long pend-

ent tassels "Being just from the outfitters, all this fine regalia was perfectly fresh and new, and somehow or other it added to the ghastliness of the spectacle on the hillside. The corpses wer in all sorts of strange postures, and their fantastic costumes gave them an air of horrible grotesqueness that I couldn't begin to describe in words.

"However, to come to my point, had picked up a fez to carry away as a relic and was about to leave the spot when I happened to notice a much landsomer specimen on the head of a little zounve stretched out, stiff and stark, a few yards away, with a bandkerchief over his face. I stepped up to make a 'swap,' but had barely touched the tassel when a low, sweet tone voice under the handkerchief said, 'Please don't!'

"For a moment," continued the veteran, "that unpleasant protest, comin from what I had supposed to be a corpse, made my hair bristle on my head. Then I lifted the handkerchief and was shocked to see the delicate, refined features of a boy not over 15. He was pale as death and evidently lesperately wounded, but he looked at me calmly. 'My God,' I exclaimed, what a lad you are to be here!" 'I'm afraid I'm dying unless I have belp, be replied. 'Do you think the surgeons will be around pretty soon? "The Lord knows!' I grouped, for the boy's courage touched me to the heart. surgeons have all run away, and we only have a few, with more wounded than they can attend to.' 'Then I guess all I can do is to He here quietty and die,' he said in the same gentle voice. 'Can you get me a little water before

"I took his canteen and hurried down to a branch at the foot of the bill where the first thing I saw, by the way, was the corpse of a zouave floating in a pool. I went up the stream far enough to get out of the horrible death tone, filled the capteen with pure waler and was soon back at the boy's sid I gave bin a drink, and he thanked me. Is there nothing else I can do? I asked awkwardly, because I knew our company was under early marching orders that morning and that it would be impossible for me to linger much longer Nothing at all, thank you,' he replied. 'No menuage to anybody? 'No; noth-

ing, thanks." "I turned away most reluctantly and had gone only a few yards when i heard his thin voice calling me back.

Excuse me, he said, but I want you to accept this as a present, and he handed me his fine purple fes. No, as, I exclaimed, greatly embarrassed; I couldn't think of taking it. When couldn't think of taking it. When I started to a little while ago, I thought I yas dead, of course, be interrupted. Well, I soon will be, and that other fee will do per just as well. Please put it on my head and take nine. I saw that he would be hurt unless I did as he desired, so I sook the fee and west area. took the fez and went away.

"In less than half an bour our com-pany was on the march, and, needless to any, b never heard anything more of the little child nonnye. He was indly wounded and undoubtedly died-where the little child some. He was tadily wounded and audoubtedly died-where I left him. I kept the fee a long time," added the teteran, "but it was finally lost, with other adds and ends, in the general confusion following the war. I'd give some money for it today,"—New Orleans Times Democrat.
