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### CONDON PLANT SOLD.

Blades Lumber Company Purchases Mill Property and Timber Lands.

The most important property sale in years in this section has just been consummated, it being the sale of the Condon Mill property in this city, together with the timber land belonging to the Condon property.

The mill property in this city consists of saw mill, planing mill and dry kilns.

The timber lands consist of nine thousand acres in Jones and Pamlico counties.

Mr. David Condon, the seller, has been actively engaged here in business for about thirty two years, while the Blades Lumber Company is well known throughout Eastern Carolina, having already large milling interests here and at Elizabeth City, besides owning large tracts of timber lands in this section of the State.

The Blades Company has already taken possession of the mill here, and will run it in their regular course of business.
