A NATION OF FARMERS.

The farming community, round about a city, when it is thriving one, is a bulwark of strength, commercially, to the city thus surrounded.

Manufacturing plants add much to the prosperity of a place, but it is a question if manufacturers equal farms in all the best effects, or give the city a growth as stable as that coming from an industrious farming community.

With all the growth of towns and cities, this country is still a nation of farmers, for the census returns of 1900 show that there were 5,700,000 farms under cultivation, against 4,594,091 in 1890.

Of this increase the Philadelphia Ledger says:

"This may be deemed a remarkable increase, showing that the growth of our industries is symmetrical, the farmers keeping pace in the march forward. The single discouraging feature of the situation is the increase of tenant farming. This is accounted for, however, to some extent by lease of lands by immigrants who are intending purchasers. As the area of unoccupied arable lands in the United States becomes less and less, it is altogether probable that future censuses of the country will show a comparative decline in the number of farms. The heavy increase in the past ten years is in the nature of a surprise, though the inducements of fine crops and fair prices have doubtless given a spur to land investments since 1898."

DEGENERATE PLANTS.

The potato has been propagated for many years by sprouts which start from the eyes of the tuber that potato is becoming almost unknown even in the farming districts where these useful vegetables are the chief agricultural product. It happens also that sugar cane has been subjected to a similar treatment except that the sprouts from which the plants are reproduced have started from the joints of the cane which have been planted instead of seeds.

In both instances there were practical reasons for the methods of propagation—namely, that merchantable potatoes and sugar yielding canes were originally quickly produced by the planting of sprouts, while seed plantings necessitated a considerable delay. After hundreds of years of such plantings botanists have discovered that both plants have nearly lost the seed producing faculty and that the few seeds which occasionally appear are generally unfruitful. In the case of the potato, this is particularly noticeable, as in a great majority of instances the blossoms wither and drop off without the development of the grape-like fruit which should contain the seeds. Yet this discovery of the botanists would not seriously affect the practical farmer were it not that it has revealed another fact equally important. The second discovery, briefly stated, is that constant reproduction from sprouts, like inbreeding in the case of animals, results in degeneracy and ultimately in the disappearance of the species unless it is revived and renewed by the crossing of seedlings.

Particular attention has been given to this matter in the laboratory of economic botany at Harvard University and resulted in the sending of a representative to Java, where the seed of the sugar cane is still being cultivated, with the result that a cane exceptionally rich in sugar is produced. Through the efforts of Mr. Oakes Ames, assistant director of the Harvard botanical garden, specimens of fruitful seed have been secured in Cuba, and the restoration of the plant has been undertaken in a scientific manner. The improvement of the potato has at the same time been undertaken by Mr. Luther Burbank of Santa Rosa, Cal., an enthusiastic horticulturist who has undertaken the perpetuation and improvement of the potato seed.
