RALEIGH.

Governor Aycock Cannot Attend Wrightsville Meeting.

School Law Sent Out. Crops Damaged 25 per Cent in State. Base Ball. Lawyers Go to Atlantic Bar Meeting.

RALEIGH, N. C., June 26.—Governor Aycock is compelled, greatly to his regret, to abandon his plan of going to the meeting of the Bar Association at Wrightsville.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction says he has completed the work of sending the new school law to all the counties.

Adjutant-General Royster is here and says there may be a change in the order in which the three regiments of the State Guard go into camp at Wrightsville.

The plumbing of the executive mansion is found to be of a very bad type and Governor Aycock is arranging to have it all done anew.

Commissioner of Agriculture Patterson who has returned from Piedmont, North Carolina, says he is sure from observation and reports that the crops in this State are damaged 25 per cent. He adds that the damage is of course much greater than this on lowlands.

The stock company now playing at the summer theatre in the park at Charlotte is to appear here in comedy and vaudeville.

The Raleigh baseball team is now stronger than at any time this year. Its fielding is greatly improved.

Rev. W. G. Clements, the veteran superintendent of public instruction of this county, says from personal observation he is prepared to assert that the crops are worse than he ever saw them save in the "rainy year," 1897.

Fight With De Wet.

CAPE TOWN, June 25.—Details of the engagement between General Elliott's columns and Dewet's force, near Pettit June 6, shows that the British surprised the Boer convoy. The burghers fled, but seeing the captives were not in strong force, the Boers returned and charged with great determination, after desperate fighting, recapturing the convoy. Meanwhile Colonel DeWet arrived with reinforcements and the fighting was renewed. The Boers lay beneath their wagons and snidely fired volleys between the wheels, while their comrades were engaged in incessant and driving off that portion of the convoy furthest from the British. The latter pushed in among the wagons, using the bayonets freely.

General DeWet was present and personally used a rifle. A man at his right hand was killed, and the comrade on his left had a head wound. The affair ended in a series of hand-to-hand encounters and there, unless the Boers eventually being driven off. One of General DeWet's staff officers was wounded and taken prisoner.

RAILROAD SHOPS CLOSED.

The Company Unable to get Coal to Operate its Plant.

ROANOKE, Va., June 25.—In accordance with an order from General Manager Johnson, of the Norfolk and Western Railway, who is now in the Pocahontas coalfields rushing railroad repair work in the region recently devastated by the storm, a notice was posted at the Roanoke Machine Works this morning closing the shops at 12 o'clock today.

The notice stated that the shut down would be for only a few days and was due to the fact that no coal is now passing over the Road. Nearly 1,800 men are affected by this order, but the majority of the men seem well satisfied with a few days' rest.

DEATH LIST SHRINKS.

Fatalities in West Virginia Flood Not So Great. Financial Loss is Heavy.

BLUESFIELD, W. Va., June 26.—When might fell to day on the Elkhorn Valley the mystery of 60 miles length which has been as a sealed book since the cloudburst of Saturday, was still unveiled. From Vivian to where the Pocahontas branch leaves the Elkhorn at Williamson the report has been received. All that is known is that there has been a flood 75 miles long, and that in a space of 15 of these 75 miles \$2,000,000 worth of property and at least 20 lives were wiped out. But nothing came from the remainder of the valley. The exploring party report discovering about five unburied bodies along the stream. It is probable that not more than 24 persons lost their lives. The Pocahontas branch, made clear by today's report, is more than half wiped off the map for a distance of 75 miles. With this wreckage have gone the numerous sidings to the collieries and lumber operations. While some progress was made in restoring the tracks today, it was insignificant compared with what is yet to be done. General Agent Johnson has only 1,000 men working today and in four days has succeeded in establishing connection only for light traffic from Mayberry to Norfolk, a distance of six miles. The Pocahontas region supplied 60 per cent of the freight that originated on the Norfolk and Western system.

Winding Timepieces.

"I have been doing a little figuring on time," remarked an erratic citizen yesterday, "and I have reached some rather interesting conclusions. I wanted to find out how much time man consumed in keeping tabs on time, and I found that, if the whole world is considered in the computation, years would be crowded into a second of time. To illustrate what I mean, take a city where 100,000 watches are wound up every day. Now, it takes probably an average of 15 seconds to wind a watch. It would take, then, 1,500,000 seconds to wind 100,000 watches. This would mean 25,000 minutes or 416 hours and 10 minutes, or 25 days and 10 hours. I suppose there are in the city of New Orleans 100,000 watches and clocks to be wound up every day, so that nearly a month is spent in the city every day in winding watches and clocks. One man in a year's time would consume 5,475 seconds in winding his watch if he is prompt about it and is willing to give 15 seconds every day to this useful article. This would mean several hours during every year that he kept up the practice. Allowing 35 years as the average life, a man would spend 191,525 seconds, or 5,100 minutes and 81 seconds, or 850 hours and 10 minutes, or 35 days and 20 hours, in winding his watch."—New Orleans Times-Democrat.

What the Saw.

It was at the Normal school that this happened, and the class laughed. It was a laugh on the teacher, too, but he didn't get angry, although it did break into the serious contemplation of serious studies with which he was trying to interest the students. It was in the study of psychology, and they were discussing what ideas first entered the human mind when certain words were spoken or written—whether the mind thought of one certain object designated by the word or the whole general class which it included in that word. To experiment on this mental phenomenon it was to bring it more clearly to the attention of the students the professor said he would write a word on the board and then let one of them tell instantly what impression was made upon her mind. He called upon one of the pupils to be ready to think quickly and tell exactly what her first thought was after she saw the word which he was about to write. He stood alone in the school so that the word was hidden by his shoulders until he turned. He wrote the word "pig," and all of the class saw it except the girl who was standing ready to think. When he turned, he didn't get out of his way, and she couldn't see the word. "What word do you see?" she asked. "I see 'pig,'" she said. "And the class laughed."—Washington Herald.
