A Hero by Inheritance. In his statute of the Second North Carolink Infantry, recently published in the first volume of the "Histories of the Regiments from North Carolins in the Secut War of 1961-55," Captair Matt

Manly rolutes an interesting and obser scieristic seventure of his comrade Lieut, James M. Holmon, the father of Richmond P. Holson whose daring in the sinking of the Merrimac in the har-bor of Santiago, Cubs, is so well nown.

Lieut. James M. Hobson was a Lieu tenant of Company E, recruited princi-cipally in Guilford County, in the 2nd legiment, and the incident related occurred at one of the battles at Spottaylvania Court House in May, 1864. It cems that the son Richmond P. Houson es very honestly by his gallantry, and it is rather remarkable that the dash and bravery of father and son resulted in the capture of both.

Oaptain Manly writes:

"James M. Hobson was captured a Spottsylvania after a race for a stand of colors. One of the color-bearers of the anemy, somewhat bolder than his comrades, planted his staff well in front end stood by it to meet our attack, Jim Hobson, with an eye, possibly. to the 'Well done, old fellow', from his companious, or the hope of getting a mention in general orders, if the eye of the General should happily be upon him,-the equivalents with us of the Victoria Cross,dashed forward to capture the colorbearer. Hobson had no firearme, and could only secure the colors by outrunning his man. The race was a fast one -'nip and fuck'- with Hobson gaining, but the course was too short, and both disappeared within the lines of the encmy. Hobson caught his man but it was too late. He caught also the butt of a

musket on his pate, and kept on to Fort Delaware, where he saw more than enough of the Stars and Stripes. His son, Richmond P. Hobson, comes fairly by his gallant spirit."

s hereby given that, on or about July 8, 1901, the following-named lights will be abed in Neuse River. A fixed white post-lautern light, 12 eet above the water, on a black threeplie structure recently erected in about feet of water, on the westerly end of

Great Island Sheals, easterly side of the entrance to Clubfoot Creek and on the southerly tide of Neuss River. The approximate geographical position of the light, as taken from Chart

No. 144 of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, will be:

Latitude, North, 84° 55' (15''); Longitude, West, 76º 45' (86"). Wilkinson Point Shoal Beacon Light, NW. # N., 84 miles.

A fixed white post-lantern light, 12 feet above the water, on a red three-pile structure recently erected in about'4 feet of water off Turn Stake Point the northerly side of Neuse river, about 2 miles northerly of New Bern.

A fixed white post-lantern light 12 feat shove the water on a black three pile structure recently erected in about feet of water on Green Shoal, southerly side of Neuse river, about half mile

Bearings are magnetic and given approximately; miles are nautical miles; heights are referred to mean high water, depths to mean low water.




License Tax Notice!


