## PENSION APPLICANTS.

Closing Seaboard Shops Causes Deep Concern.

Takes Oath For Judge. Intermed. State School Books Dropped. 1945 Smallpox Cases Last Year. State Board Elections.

RALEIGH, N. C., July 1.—There was a great rush of applicants for pensions at the court house to-day. The applications were considered by the county officers and commissioners and board of veterans.

The year's revenue collections for district are \$2,594,051, against \$2,890,498 for the last fiscal year. The June collections were \$333,140.

Saturday night several of the striking machinists of the Seaboard Air Line attacked two of the men on the street in a savage manner, beat them and ran. The impression prevails that the various assaults made during the past month have been by the wilder spirits among the strikers. The strikers are dazed by the railway's new move in closing the shops here. They say they will rest, for awhile at least, then leave Raleigh in search of work.

Judge Francis D. Winston came here yesterday and to-day received his commission and took the oath. He will hold his first court at Winston, August 13.

The State board of public school examiners decided at its meeting at Chapel Hill Saturday to defer action regarding the 7 negro normal schools until after the State board of education passes upon the matter. The latter board meets July 14.

Next Friday the tents for the use of the State Guard will be taken to Wrightsville. There are 1 hospital, 50 officers and 330 enlisted men's tents.

Attorney General Glimer decides that the State text book commission did not have the right to adopt intermediate books. This therefore causes the dropping of Hyde's second language lessons, and of Moses' spelling. Milve's arithmetic will not be on the list. The publishers declined to furnish it at the price the commission named. Even if the price had been satisfactory the attorney general's opinion would have ruled the book out.

During the year ended May 30 there were 1945 cases of small pox in this State, of which 530 were of whites; and 36 deaths, of which 15 were of whites.

The State board of elections appointed by Gov. Aycock, composed of Wilson G. Lamb of Williamson, R. A. Doughton of Sparta; Robert L. Claywell of Morgan, Democrat, and Clarence Call of Wilkesboro and A. B. Froeman of Henderson, Republican, met today, as required by law, and organized by electing R. L. Doughton President and Robert L. Claywell Secretary.

There will be a session of the corporation commission this week.

Of the 55 inmates of the soldiers' home here 16 are now sick in the new hospital.

In the next 60 days two more rural free delivery routes out of Raleigh are to be established.

The receipts of the Raleigh postoffice for fiscal year ended yesterday were \$45,530, against \$41,955 the previous year. In 1904 they were \$35,615.

Dr. D. H. Abbott of the corporation commission has returned from his trip to California.

### Nineteen Deaths in New York.

New York, June 30.—The relief from the killing heat of the last week, which was promised today in the shape of thunderstorms, did not materialize. At noon today the government thermometer registered 85 degrees, at 3 o'clock this afternoon 93 degrees and at 4 p. m., 97 degrees, 5 degrees more than the maximum temperature Saturday. After this a drop came and at 9 p. m., the mercury touched 85.

There was an increase in the fatalities reported today over yesterday, though the number of simple prostrations was not so large. Up to midnight tonight 19 deaths had been reported and 10 prostrations. The deaths yesterday numbered 11.

### 15,000 Hare Ordered Out.

DYSSONIA, June 30.—President T. J. Shaffer, of the Associated Association of Lion, Bad and Tin Workers, tomorrow will leave on order calling out all union employees of the various mills of the American Steel and Wire Company, known as the long list. It is estimated that 15,000 men will be subject to the call, which, in connection with the big strike of the American Steel and Wire Company, ordered by President Shaffer on Saturday, will affect 50,000 men.

## A. & N. C. REPORT.

### The Heat in Kansas.

KANSAS CITY, June 30.—Missouri and Kansas are suffering from hot winds that threaten great damage to corn. Atchison, Kansas, reports the greatest drought in northwestern Kansas since 1890, a warm wind having blown from the south almost unceasingly for the past seven days. Abilene, Kansas, reports 105-degree weather with many fields in South Wickliff county ruined. A Mexico, Mo., dispatch says the thermometer in that part of the State registered 101 yesterday and today and that if rain does not come soon the farmers will have to put their stock on the market immediately to save it. Sedalia, Mo., reports 108 degrees in the shade with the statement that another week of similar weather will make certain a failure of the corn crop in central Missouri.

## NEGRO SHOT AND KILLED.

Discovered Prowling About Mr. West's House Refuses to Surrender.

DORNA, July 1.—Quite a little excitement was created here Saturday night between ten and eleven o'clock. The cause of the affair was about as follows: The family of Mr. T. L. West had retired except two of his girls who were preparing to retire. One of them was sitting close by a raised window, undressed, waiting for her sister to say her prayers and in the meantime she happened to part the curtains to the window and there saw approaching within arms reach, a negro.

They, both, terribly excited ran to their father's room and gave the alarm. Mr. West immediately started to investigate and by the time he got out of the house he saw the negro running but shortly overtook him.

By this time Mr. West's son appeared on the scene. The negro seemed to think he was going to be shot as he kept saying, "Please don't shoot me," which he would not do if he would be quiet, but he snatched away from Mr. West and began fleeing. They ordered him to halt but to no effect. Then young Mr. West began shooting at him and kept it up until the negro cleared the yard but was soon overtaken by Policemen Sutton. Upon investigation it was found that one ball had struck him in the back and made a right serious wound.

Dr. Ray Pollock was summoned and probed for the ball but could not find it. The negro died today about three o'clock. He said there was another man with him. He told several stories as to why he was there.

The general opinion is that they were loitering and scuffling themselves around Mr. West's yard to commit some dastardly crime and were simply waiting for the chance.

Coroner J. W. Dugan held an inquest here tonight on the dead man.

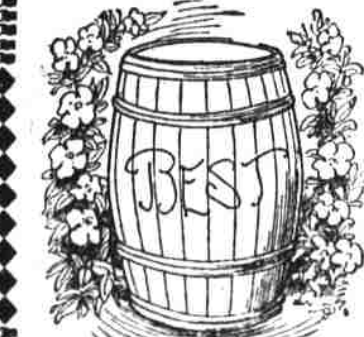
