RALEIGH.

Base Ball League Left to North Carolina.

Immature Soldiers Home Missing. Returned from Philippines. Crop News. Encouraging Educational Outlook. Examinations for Peabody College.

RALEIGH, N. C., July 8.—The Raleigh base ball team left today for Tarboro to play three games and then return here, to play with Tarboro the remainder of the week. The league will be composed of four North Carolina teams, all of which telegraphed last night that they were in to stay to the end of the season. The collapse of the Richmond team was by no means unexpected and of course Norfolk had to go too, as a five team league is an impossibility. The fact that the league is made up entirely of North Carolina teams naturally increases the interest. It is understood here that the Norfolk players will be sold by Cunningham to the best advantage. Efforts made by Detroit to get Person and by New Orleans to get Stanley have failed. These are two of Raleigh's strong pitchers.

Julius Henry, an inmate of the Soldiers Home here is missing. He has wandered away. Last Thursday he disappeared. His home is Snow Hill. He is not of sound mind and it is said he has wandered away from his old home a number of times.

Capt. James E. Hamlin, late of the 47th negro regiment returned here today after two years service in the Philippines. Several of his men returned, but most of them will remain in the army. Hamlin brought with him a Filipino boy, of 9 years, whom he has adopted and will educate. The boy was found wandering.

The strange fact is ascertained that while in practically all this county the crops are the poorest in years, yet in a section around Wakefield, sixteen miles in diameter, they were never better. This applies to all crops.

State superintendent of public instruction Toon has returned from a visit to Ashe and Alleghany counties. He made speeches in the interest of education and says he returns encouraged by the outlook. He spoke at Trap Hill, where the collegiate institute has been closed for some time, but after his speech he was assured by leading citizens that it would be reopened and maintained.

The examinations for scholarships in the Peabody Normal college will be held July 15-19, in various counties, and county superintendents can obtain from the State Superintendent of public instruction the questions which are to be asked.

Pierre Lorillard Dead.

New York, July 7.—Pierre Lorillard died at 2:10 o'clock this afternoon. The death of Mr. Lorillard took place at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, where he was taken from the Deutschland when that steamer arrived from Europe July 4.

Pierre Lorillard was the eldest son of Peter Lorillard, architect of the fortune which made the family name famous. He inherited much of the business ability of his father and marked success attended the commercial enterprises which he planned and executed. At the death of his father, he received about \$1,000,000 and an interest jointly with his brothers and sisters in the great tobacco house of which his father had been the head. He at once purchased from his brothers control of the house and by shrewd business management greatly increased his fortune. He built a handsome residence at Fifth Avenue and Fifty-sixth street and entertained in princely manner. In 1876 he became interested in the turf. His first great horse was Farnish, and with Iniquity in 1881 he was the first American to win the classic English derby. He was also an enthusiastic yachtsman and once won the Vesta across the Atlantic. He founded and controlled at the time of his death the fashionable resort at Tuxedo. He was nearly 60 years old. He is survived by his wife, son, Pierre Lorillard, Jr., and daughter, Mrs. T. Butler Taylor and Mrs. William Kent. He leaves a large fortune.

Valuable estimates have been made of the value of Mr. Lorillard's estate, and while its exact value at the present time is not known, it is believed to be more than \$25,000,000. As long ago as 1894 it was said to be from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

The Train Robbers Got Away.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., July 7.—Special Agent from a staff correspondent of The Annapolis Standard on the ground, says to the effect that there is now little hope of the Sheriff's posse overtaking the men who held up the Great Northern express train at Wagner, Md., last Wednesday. The messenger has just returned from the station of country where the posse were expected to overtake the train. He reports that the posse have been scattered and the robbers have escaped.
