THE NEAL CASE.

Judge Purnell Affirms Finding of Special Master Green.

Appointed Director Oxford Orphan Asylum. Saloon Boundary Case. Base Ball Items. To Sit at Circuit Court Appeals Richmond.

Raleigh, July 9.—Governor Aycock appoints Dred Peacock of Greensboro a director of the Oxford Orphan Asylum, vice Ben N. Duke, resigned.

Commissioner of Agriculture Patterson and Dr. George T. Winston, President of the Agricultural and Mechanical College have gone North to select a professor of agriculture. They will also look out for a veterinarian. It is probable that Professor Tait Butler of Kansas, will be the veterinarian. He is president of the National Veterinary Association.

Arrivals: Richard J. Jones, G. H. Smith, Wilmington; John D. Briggs, Williamson; Irwell Means, Wilmington; B. F. Aycock, Wayne county; Ex-Governor D. L. Russell, Wilmington. The latter is counsel in a suit by saloon keepers here against the city, to recover taxes they have for many years paid the city on bar-rooms outside the boundary, involving some \$12,000. Ex-Governor Russell says there are other suits of the same kind against the town of Dunn.

A telegram from Manager H. T. Bryan of the Tarboro Base Ball Club, who was in Norfolk to buy the Norfolk team was received this morning and appeared to mean that he had been successful. He wanted Mace made an umpire, and not Staley. President Cunningham offered his Norfolk team to Raleigh for \$1,000, but it was not wanted here. Judge T. N. Purnell today received a letter from Judge Goff notifying him that he and Judge Jackson of West Va., would again sit on the circuit court of appeals at Richmond at the next term. Twice last year, in May and November, Judge Purnell sat on that court.

In the important case of R. S. Neal et al. vs. G. F. Briggs & Co., of Norfolk, involving a large sawmill and timber interests at Morhead City, Judge Purnell today affirmed the finding of special master Green of New Bern, as to facts and law. The effect of the decision is that Briggs & Co. are indebted to Neal and the First National Bank of New Bern in the sum of \$45,353, instead of Neal being indebted to Briggs, as claimed, to the amount of \$18,000. The principle point in the case is that exception to a report of a special master under the equity rules of the circuit court must be specific and point out errors in equity rule 37, and that general exceptions will not be considered by the chancellor. This is in accordance also with the State practice. Notwithstanding this point Judge Purnell stilling as chancellor, took up the several exceptions and over ruled them seriatim. This case came up from the circuit court at New Bern.

PORT AU PRINCE, HAITI, July 9.—A violent storm has been raging three days over the southern part of Haiti and Santo Domingo.

Five persons were killed at Jacmel and nine lost their lives at Les Cayes. Several sailing vessels have been wrecked. The region between Otili and La Vega and the city of Santo Domingo has been inundated.

Telegraphic communication with Santo Domingo is broken. The rivers have overflowed. A high wind continues.

Raleigh, July 9.—Telegram from Manager Bryan of Tarboro ball club says he has his team complete, having secured Norfolk President Sherwood Higgin of the North Carolina league, today deposited salary for umpire and appointed W. R. Robertson of Charlotte. All umpires will be North Carolinians. The committee on schedule of games has prepared an excellent one. It gives 58 games beginning today and ending September 7th. Each team plays 9 games with each team, then the winning team plays the Wilmington team eleven games for the championship, dates and places to be left to teams thus competing.

CROP BULLETIN.

Conditions More Favorable For Farm Work and Growth of Crops.

Week Ending July 8th.

Raleigh, July 9.—The weekly crop bulletin for week ending Monday, July 8th, is as follows:

The conditions which prevailed during the past week appear to have been decidedly favorable for farm work and the growth of crops in nearly all counties of the State, except where drought is now beginning to be felt. The temperature averaged 6° daily above the normal; the maximum varied from 90° to 100° every day of the week, and the nights have been quite warm. The amount of sunshine was abundant. Some very beneficial showers occurred in the central-northeast section on Tuesday and Saturday evenings, and a heavy rain on the 2d in Halifax and Northampton counties with slight damage to crops. In general, however, the week has been very dry, and gave farmers a favorable opportunity to kill grass and plow their crops in a better state of cultivation. In sections where the rainfall was not excessive during June, especially in the eastern district, drought is now beginning to injure some crops, especially corn and gardens, and the ground is becoming dry and hard over many counties, which hinders plowing and planting field peas in stubble land.

Farmers have made very good use of their time this week, in spite of the scarcity of hands, and grass has generally been brought under control; many fields are now well cultivated, and crops thereon have improved very materially. Lowland crops are still in bad condition and many have been abandoned. Cotton has improved considerably where properly cultivated; plants are small, but healthy and vigorous and blooms are more abundant; poorly cultivated fields still show a yellow color. Corn is being generally laid by; the crop has a rich green color and has grown rapidly during the week; uplands need rain and soil bottomland corn is very poor; early corn is tasseling low, but the late corn is better. Curing tobacco has just commenced in a few eastern counties, and some cures have been made; laying by the crop has begun in the central district; there is some complaint of the lack of sufficient moisture in the east. Except some spring oats yet to be cut, harvesting the small grain crops is about over; most of the wheat, rye, and oats have been housed and threshing is underway. Sweet-potatoes have all been transplanted and are growing nicely. Some peanuts have been laid by. Field peas look well, and stubble land is being sowed to corn, where not too hard to plow. Fruit is still falling considerably, and the outlook for grapes is not very good. Mowing has begun in several counties, with promise of a fine yield of hay.

Great Wheat Fields Harvested.

Great Bend, Kan., July 9.—Fifty thousand acres of wheat went up in flames here this afternoon. The fire was started by an unknown man throwing a lighted cigar into a field of wheat stubble. Everything was as dry as tinder, and soon a tremendous fire was in progress.

All the residents here left their work and abandoned every known method for fighting fire, but to no avail, and it was not until the evening hours that the fire was under control. Roughly estimated the loss will aggregate \$250,000, including some 25,000 bushels of wheat.

Rain Helps Suffering India.

LONDON, July 9.—The Viceroy of India, Lord Carson of Kedleston, cables that the rainfall in the Bombay, Deccan, Eastern Bengal, Burma and Assam has been generally sufficient for agricultural purposes. The total number of persons employed on the India relief works is now 525,000.

Constitution Exceeds Expectations.

Newport, July 9.—The race today was remarkable for two things. First, the Constitution beat the Columbus by 20 minutes, 35 seconds, over a thirty-mile triangular course, and the Independence, the Boston boat, was beaten 1 hour, 12 minutes, 14 seconds. These are actual times, without time allowances.

The race was called in a light wind, and the Constitution was just a few seconds under five hours making the thirty miles. The time for an American cup race is five and a half hours, so that today's race would have been within the time.

The race Saturday was a few minutes over the five and a half hours, and Boston yachtmen have used this as an argument that it was only a drifting matter and should not be counted. The wind today was not so strong as it was Saturday, but there were only ten miles sailed to windward and twenty miles were reaching. On the best, in the first week, the Constitution sailed 27 seconds on the Columbus.
