## RALEIGH.

### Fourth Day of Rain, Farmers Anxious.

Two Children Drowned in Creek. Veteran Returned. Aycock Not Senatorial Aspirant. Bankrupt Case Striking S. A. L. Marchants.

Raleigh, July 15.—Today was the fourth of almost continuous rain. Streams are at flood, lowlands under water, no outdoor work can be done, and sad-faced farmers are asking what is the future. The rains Saturday and yesterday caused a great deal of damage. Streams rose with wonderful rapidity, and reached almost the height attained in May.

Two children of Charles Emery, four miles from here were drowned yesterday afternoon in House's Creek, which is usually a mere branch, but which is now a torrent. There were three children. They had crossed the stream earlier on a visit. The stream rose and was over the foot-log when they tried to return. The oldest, a girl, carried the youngest across on the log, but when attempting to take her brother across both were swept away. The cries of the survivor brought help, but it took time to find the drowned children in a submerged meadow, some distance away.

Julius Henry, the veteran who ten days ago wandered away from the Soldiers' home here, returned today, saying he had been to Clinton to see a sister. His home is Snow Hill.

The sock and ball story that Gov. Aycock was an aspirant for the United States Senate is flatly denied, though really denial was unnecessary. The place will go to a Democrat west of Greensboro. There are at least four aspirants now.

Judge Thomas C. Fuller of the United States court of land claims, who for some months has been under medical treatment here has gone to Asheville.

The striking Seaboard Air Line machinists here are yet out, and say they are assured some money will be sent them this week from the strike fund. Some are needy. It appears that but little of the strike fund has come this way, but that some explanation of this is made. The men do not see any end of the matter in sight. They have called for money.

There was argument here to day in the matter of B. J. Handlerin, bankrupt of Wilmington, before Judge Parnell. McNair and Parnell claim priority over other creditors, by reason of certain mortgages. Franklin McNeill and E. K. Bryan appeared for McNair and Parnell and Lindell Meares for the petitioning creditors.

### Denison Drought Broken.

Denison, Tex., July 14.—The worst drought ever experienced in this section was broken this afternoon by a terrific rainfall of over two hours' duration, the volume of rain being almost equal to a cloudburst. The storm was accompanied by a wind of almost tornado force. Reports indicate that the rain is general in this vicinity. It came just in time to save the cotton crop. It will benefit the fruit crop and furnish stock water which had suitably failed causing much distress. It will also benefit lowland crops.

### Dynamite to Check Flames.

Exro, Okla., July 14.—Four blocks of business houses on the public square here were destroyed in less than three hours by a fire that started after midnight this morning.

The water supply was inadequate and it was necessary to blow up buildings with dynamite to check the flames. Owing to the continued drought everything burned like matchwood. A light wind blowing from the southeast saved the eastern part of the town. The total loss is estimated at more than \$100,000. The insurance will be light. The postoffice and the land office were saved only after a hard fight.

## GREAT DAY IN FRANCE.

Fall of the Bastille Celebrated With Patriotic Ardor. Thousands of Troops Parade.

Paris, July 14.—Telegrams from all parts of France show that the national fête, the anniversary of the fall of the Bastille, was celebrated throughout the country to day with great enthusiasm and without disorder.

There were reviews at all French military and naval stations, followed by illuminations, fireworks and balls. The Parisians joined in with their customary zest. Wreaths were placed on the Strasburg monument in the Place de la Concorde by a number of deputations. The police removed the wreaths of the Socialists, which were inscribed, "To the Fatherland's Victims." They also dispersed a delegation of the League of Patriots, who were cheering for Paul Derodele as they placed wreaths in his name upon the pedestal. A pro-Bourgeois demonstration by students was stopped by the police.

### Epworth Leaguers Robbed.

Glenwood Springs, Col. July 14.—The thoroughly organized gang of pickpockets operating at Colorado Springs is responsible for a party of about 30 Epworth Leaguers becoming stranded here.

Men and women alike have been robbed not only of every cent they had with them, but also of railroad tickets, and unless the railroads will issue tickets back home on their proof of having purchased and paid for rides to San Francisco and back they will be compelled to ask aid from the county authorities.

In at least 10 cases thieves even secured their victims' trunks on stolen baggage checks. Among those robbed are Dr. J. H. Wilson, wife and daughter and Mrs. H. R. Harrington, of Dover, Del. Dr. Wilson's wallet, containing tickets for the party, drafts on San Francisco banks and baggage checks, being stolen in the crush at the depot in Colorado Springs.

Major S. K. Hooper, general passenger agent of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, authorized the Glenwood Springs agent to furnish passes to Ogden to stranded passengers who desired to continue their journey West.

### Engineers and Firemen Quit.

Eagle Pass, Tex., July 14.—The engineers and firemen on the International Railroad have resigned and business of that road is suspended. The trainmen demanded an advance in wages and it was refused, which is the cause of their resignation. There is no concerted strike, but all the men are out. The road is a Southern Pacific property, but the men are paid in Mexican money, and this had depreciated in value, cutting down their wages.

### The Ground Dry For Several Feet.

London, July 14.—The intense heat has completely dried up the country around Berlin, says the Berlin correspondent of The Times, "and all moisture has withdrawn from the soil to a depth of several feet. Fruit is falling from the trees before it is ripe and potatoes and hay crops have been severely affected by the drought."

### June Bugs Puts Out Lights.

Zanesville, O., July 14.—Zanesville is almost entirely in darkness tonight as a result of the visitation of June bugs in countless numbers. Electric light globes are filled and the lights are completely submerged by the swarms of the burned bugs. The hotel offices are infested with such swarms that it was necessary to close the doors, notwithstanding the intense heat.

In several instances church services were interrupted with. The river bridges are almost impassable to pedestrians. The atmosphere about the lights is filled with clouds of live insects and swarms are covered to a depth of several inches by dead ones.

## FIRST BOLT FOR BRYAN.

Convention of Ohio Followers. The Men Meet in Cleveland and Decide a Bolt Should be Made.

CLEVELAND, O., July 14.—On July 8, Ohio Democrats who believe in Bryan, the issues which he represents, and that the recent Democratic convention ignored, will assemble in Columbus and make up a State ticket. Ten men met this morning in a downtown office building in this city and decided that a bolt should be made and that a new party should enter the field of Ohio politics. The attendance at the conference, it was stated, was larger and represented a greater area in the State than was expected by those who called the meeting.

A formal statement of principles was submitted to the conference and was adopted. This will be printed and sent throughout the State to those who are known to be faithful to the Nebraskan. A convention was decided upon, to be held at the Great Southern Hotel, on the last day of July. To this convention may come all those who sign their names to the declaration of the principles.
