RALEIGH.

Cape Fear and Roanoke Rivers at Danger Line.

County Treasurers Report Imperfect. Railways Complain Against Assessment Water Malona Late. Second Growth Leaves Railroad Wash-out.

RALEIGH, July 16.—The rain which had fallen for 4 days ended at noon yesterday, but at midnight began again, and is yet falling. The Cape Fear and Roanoke rivers have reached the danger line. The Neuse is rising rapidly. The Haw reached over a greater height than during the May flood.

Today the special committee of the board of agriculture, commissioner Patterson, G. T. Winston, W. A. Graham, S. L. Daughtridge and Howard Browning, met to elect a professor of agriculture for the agricultural and mechanical college here. About a dozen men of the highest ability were ready to accept this \$3000 position.

A state veterinarian is practically agreed on, but has not yet accepted. The agricultural department is rapidly collecting statistics as to all the cotton and woolen mills in the State, for its August bulletin.

The State superintendent of public instruction says many of the reports from county treasurers are improperly and imperfectly made. They must be correct or the penalty will be enforced.

Sheriff D. R. Julian of Rowan was here today on his way to Johnston county after a negro thief, whose specialty is the theft of clothing from stores.

The corporation commission devoted yesterday and today to the hearing of any complaints against its assessment of railway and other property and to the hearing of exceptions to the order requiring street railway cars to be vestibuled and provided with fenders. A B. Skelving of the Wilmington street railway appeared and spoke in opposition to the enforcement of the order regarding vestibules and fenders.

Thus far only two loads of water melons have been brought here by growers. Usually they are abundant by July 4. It seems that this year they are largely a failure.

The State Auditor today received \$803 from the Atlantic Coast Line as its part of the cost incurred by the State in the long law suit known as the tax assessment case, which was compromised last winter.

The prospect for a large theatre and auditorium here is excellent. New Yorkers will build it. This means the remodeling of the Academy of Music and its enlargement so that it will seat at least 2500 persons.

One of the queer things in this remarkable year is the second growth of the trees. These put out leaves in April, and owing to the rains a new set of leaves has appeared on every branch these leaves being as delicate as those in April. The result is two tints of green, dark and very light, on all the trees. The limb growth of trees was never greater than it has been this year.

Details of the reports were made in some quarters, including J. P. Morgan's banking house, but others said loans on those stocks could be had only with great difficulty, and where the individual seeking the loan had good personal security.

Americans' Big Contract.

Chicago, July 15.—President Harris, of the Pittsburgh Automatic Telephone Company, has closed a contract with the German Government for the exclusive use of the company's telephone throughout the Empire.

About a year ago the company equipped the Central Postoffice Station in Berlin. The result is the making of the contract.

22-KNOT CRUISERS.

Constructors Plan Swift Fighters For American Navy. Displacement 14,000 Tons.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Armored cruisers of 22 knots speed will be designed by the Naval Board on Construction. These vessels will have a displacement of 14,000 tons and a coal-carrying capacity of at least 2,000 tons. Their other characteristics have not yet been determined.

Rear-Admiral O'Neill, Chief of Ordnance, and Rear-Admiral Bowles, Chief of Construction, have prepared plans showing the batteries they will carry. If provided with 8-inch guns they will have turrets forward and aft. The board seems to be of the opinion that they should have a homogeneous battery and 7-inch guns may be adopted.

To Wreck the Taku Forts.

TIENTSIN, July 15.—The military commanders have directed the provisional government of Tientsin to undertake the destruction of the Taku forts. The Government has promised to comply on receipt of a military guard to protect the workmen engaged in the task.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—Consul Winslow, at Liege writes that Belgium is a manufacturing country, the exports last year amounting to \$350,000,000 and the imports to over \$400,000,000. Of the imports the United States contributed over \$56,000,000, against \$12,000,000 received.

May Shut Down Coal Mines.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 15.—John Mitchell, national president of the United Mine Workers of America, was asked here today what action the coal miners would take relative to the strike of the Almagamated Association.

"I can tell better what effect the steel strike will have on the coal-miners," he replied. "The coal and steel industries are so closely allied that a great strike of the steel workers and the closing down of the great mills will greatly lessen the consumption of coal. That will mean that many coal mines will cease operations."

"Is there likely to be a sympathetic strike ordered among the coal miners?" "I don't care to say anything about that," replied Mr. Mitchell. "The strike of the steel workers has not yet assumed definite proportions."

Sixty-One Men Missing.

NEW YORK, July 15.—Lieutenant Com-mander Wilmer, of the training ship Dixie, reports that 61 of his men are absent without leave. Of this number 47 are landmen, who have had two months' training at sea.

In most cases the men have overstayed their leaves 10 days, and are under the rule which obtains in the army and navy alike classed as deserters. The Dixie is expected to leave the yard early next week.

WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN.

Weather Generally Favorable. Too Much Rain in Eastern Sections.

RALEIGH, July 16.—The Weekly Crop Bulletin for week ending Monday, July 15th, is as follows:

The weather during the past week was favorable for crops throughout a large portion of the western district, and along the northern border of the State until Saturday. The most important feature was the development of two storms on the North Carolina coast. The first was confined to the immediate coast, and caused heavy rains in the east on the 8th and some damage to crops by high northeast winds. A local very heavy and damaging rain also occurred on that date over several western counties, chiefly Davie, Lincoln, Mecklenburg, Catawba, and Iredell. The second storm started near Wilmington Friday, 12th, and the rain area gradually spread over the entire State, bringing on the average about three inches of precipitation, and causing freshets in the rivers. The temperature during the week was about normal, and not extremely high, maxima were reported. The amount of sunshine was deficient.

In many western and northern counties crops made favorable progress, but in the east and south too much rain interfered again with farm work, and has started grass to growing rapidly in most all crops. Bottom lands are in very bad condition, and hardly any results are expected from them. The weather has been a little cool for cotton, and the rainy, damp conditions since the 12th is causing it to develop too much weed. Corn on uplands is doing well, and in all sections where it was suffering from drought the crop was improved by rain. Chick bugs are doing some damage in a few counties. Tobacco is growing fast and there is some fear of its taking on a second growth. Cutting and curing are proceeding slowly in the east, and topping is general in the central portion. Peanuts and sweet potatoes are good. Threshing wheat continues; a little wheat left in shock was damaged by excessive moisture. Field peas are growing nicely.

Some hay was saved during the week, and meadows are in fine condition, but the work now awaits drier weather. Grapes appear to be rotting badly, and the rainfall has been too much for melons; melons are ripening and some are coming into market. The general outlook for crops continues unpromising.
