### TO INVESTIGATE SALE.

#### Seaboard Air-Line Strikers Receive Funds.

Water Supply at Soldiers Home. Libraries for Rural Public Schools. New Bridge to be Built at Weldon.

Washouts.

RALPH, July 19.—Work has begun on the pumping station and tower for the new water supply at the Soldiers' Home here.

Superintendent of public instruction Toon has returned. He yesterday attended a teachers' institute at Wisterville, Edgecombe county, at which there were 180 teachers from that county and Greene, and he is delighted with its work.

Gen. Toon says a survey is now in progress in Tyrrell county of the last lands sold by K. S. Finch, who was by the fusion administration given an option on the State's swamp lands. An investigation is being specially made as regards this last sale.

Applications are coming in rapidly for the money the State appropriated for free libraries for the rural public schools. Of the \$5,000 appropriated it is the belief that \$2,500 will be called for this year. Next year all will be called for.

The Boyd furniture company here is making the cases in which the North Carolina exhibits at the Charleston exposition will be shown. North Carolina quarter-sawn oak is used. After use at Charleston these cases will be placed in the state museum here. They are especially designed for this double use.

It is said by inmates of the Soldiers' Home that application will be made for a separate camp of the United Confederate Veterans, composed entirely of Veterans. The latter are now members of L. O. B. Branch camp of this city.

The insurance commissioner has received an application from the Agricultural Insurance Company of Watertown N. Y., for admission to this State.

While a large force of laborers was at work between Hamlet and Southern Pines, repairing damages due to half a dozen washouts, a dam on John T. Patrick's land broke and a flood of water came down, tearing away 70 feet of track and causing other minor washouts.

The Seaboard Air-Line strikers here are greatly pleased at the receipt of funds from their Grand Lodge, though they decline to say what is the amount. For a month they had been waiting for funds. The various labor organizations here have organized themselves a committee weekly for the aid of these strikers. All labor here appears now to be organized and the washouts.

It is found that the steel bridge at Weldon, built in 1877-8 will not stand the heavy traffic, hence a new and far heavier one will be put in. The present piers will be used. There is a wooden bridge across Deep river, built in 1873, which stands the heaviest travel on the Seaboard Air-Line. It is maintained by not a few railway officials that wooden bridges out last and are superior to steel ones, always excepting damage from fire.

#### A Disease Killing Georgia Cotton.

Valdosta, Ga., July 19.—W. A. Cotton, an assistant patrol of the Department of Agriculture, at Washington, who has been here for a week investigating a disease which has been killing cotton, says the disease is caused by fungus in the soil which clings the roots in the field and causes the plant to with. He says when the fungus once gets into the soil it will live as long as cotton is planted upon that soil.

#### Wages Increased.

FOYVILLE, Pa., July 19.—The Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company has issued notices at 35-centiles for the wages of stationary firemen to \$2.00 a week, which, with the 15 per cent. granted last week, makes the wages equal to \$2.35 per week. The new rate went into effect July 1st.

#### Perils of Dismal Swamp.

SUFFOLK, Va., July 18.—News came here this afternoon of a remarkable snake story in the Dismal Swamp. Grant Wilkins (colored), thirty-five years old, while seeking shingle timber, sat down by a juniper tree and slept with his mouth open. A long black snake came along and crawled in nearly two feet. When found Wilkins was dead, with three feet of live snake protruding from his mouth.

It took considerable strength to extract the reptile. By the side of the corpse were a beer bottle and sardine box, the remnants of the luncheon. There is a question as to whether the snake investigated the open mouth just because it looked like a hole or whether it was attracted by sardines. Wilkins died of suffocation.

DALLAS, TEXAS, July 18.—The drought in Texas is still unbroken. The heat today is as intense as the average for the last three weeks. #### Governor's New Pardon Rules.

RALPH, July 19.—The new pardon rules which the Governor will enforce are excellent. By requiring 60 days notice of any and all applications for pardon they prevent any underhand or secret work by applicants. Of this in the past there has been so little.

#### Marvels of the Arc Light.

Are the light the most brilliant of artificial lights, followed as a natural result of the generation of electricity by the dynamo, and each light absorbs nearly one horsepower. There are more than 50,000 arc lamps burning at night in Greater New York, and daily 42 tons of coal every hour are consumed. One horsepower can furnish current enough to keep about 12 incandescent electric lamps lighted, and in Greater New York there are now in use over 1,000,000 of these lamps. The total power required for the electric lighting of this great city is certainly not less than 200,000 horsepower, more than the combined power of all the ships of the United States navy.—Leslie's Weekly.
