### RALEIGH.

#### Six Weeks Before Penitentiary Finance Report.

S. A. L. Strikers Loose. Others Desitate. Southern Striks at Spencer Over. Half Crop Cotton.

Ex-treasurer Worth to pay Clerk Martin's Shortage.

RALEIGH, July 22.—Bickering on the textile school at the Agricultural and Mechanical College began today. Rain has delayed the work.

Only 18 of the striking Seaboard Air Line machinists here are now in Raleigh. The strike is on its last legs. The few strikers remaining will give a lawn party tomorrow to raise funds, some of them being in Raleigh. The strike is over at the Southern railway's shops at Spencer.

Mrs. Edward F. Moss, wife of the superintendent of Raleigh city schools died at her home here last night.

The cotton dealers here say their present estimate for this section is a little more than half a crop, and that there will have to be a remarkably late fall to develop anything like a full crop.

Chairman McNeill of the corporation commission leaves tomorrow for Johnson county to confer with the county commissioners and register of deeds regarding taxation under the new law. He will also go to Harnett and Cumberland and then to Pender and some other counties. Commissioner Abbott has gone to Pamlico for the same purpose.

The railways have refunded to the State \$2,350 costs which it incurred last year and in 1899 in the tax assessment case in the United States Circuit Court.

The railways are this year paying taxes to the State on a \$42,000,000 valuation.

It will be perhaps six weeks before the reports of the penitentiary finances are ready. Mr. Long as expert, who is at work on the books, says: "He finds that the late management actually put sales of horses, mules, and other animals on hand as net earnings in the report made up to December 31; in other words padded the report."

State Treasurer Lucy said today: "I have notified Ex-treasurer Worth that he must pay up the amount of his clerk W. H. Martin's delinquency at once. He will not stand as such. At one time I thought he intended to stand one. He has not put any expert to work on the books."

**Hottest Chicago Known in 30 Years.**  
Chicago, July 21.—All heat records since the establishment of the Weather Bureau in Chicago, 30 years ago were broken today, the government thermometer registering 100 degrees. Down on the street it was from 8 to 8 degrees lower, and to what to the suffering a hot, stifling wind, like a blast from a furnace blow all day from the southwest. From 5 o'clock in the morning, when the thermometer registered 77, a gradual rise followed until, at 4:30 this afternoon, the top notch had been reached. Shortly after that time the wind veered around toward the lake and caused a drop to 95 at 5:30 to night. Prostrations were numerous and police ambulances were kept busy taking care of persons who were overcome on the streets.

**Firmen's Strike Collapses.**  
Wilmington, Pa., July 21.—The stationary firmen's strike has practically collapsed. At a conference here today between the executive board of the United Mine Workers and the striking firmen's committee, were appointed to wait on the coal companies and if the strikers are taken back the strike will be declared off.

**Dr. Kruger's Wife Dead.**  
Petersburg, July 21.—Mrs. Kruger, wife of former President Kruger, of the South African Republic, died yesterday of pneumonia, after an illness of three days. She was 67 years old.

Mrs. Kruger's long experience from her husband, combined with the death of her beautiful daughter, Mrs. Seale, last week, had completely broken her spirits. Mr. Kruger and many members of the Kruger family were at her bedside when she passed away.

### WOE THREATENS MANY.

Thousands Will Lose in Struggle For Oklahoma Homes.

Fort Hill, Oklahoma, T., July 21.—Disorder and distress will, it is feared, follow the actual opening of the Kiowa-Comanche lands.

It is now estimated that fully 150,000 people will have registered for a chance to secure one of the 15,000 claims to be awarded by lottery when the registration booths close on July 30. Thousands of persons now on the reservation, who are neither mechanics nor artisans and who have little or no money, announce their intention of locating around Lawton if they should fail to win a claim. Campers, who came in prairie schooners by the thousands, generally brought with them provisions sufficient to last only from five to ten days.

Continued drought has caused the water to be restricted, and for days a hot wind has blown over the prairie, and the temperature has averaged above the 100° mark. With these conditions before them, many are already beginning to grumble, and when this shall be followed by disappointment by failure to draw a lucky number, the hopes of many will doubtless give way to more serious conditions.

**Siberian Crops Fail.**  
London, July 21.—A dispatch to the Evening Standard from Odessa says that according to the reports of special agents the Siberian crops appear to be nearly a total failure.

In the great grain producing regions of Hinussinsk and Krasnoyarsk almost the entire growth of cereals has perished as a result of two months' drought. The conditions are almost equally deplorable in the Krasno-Obninsk, Kimgorsk, Oskansk, Soltkamsk, Soltkamsk, Perm and Schadrinsk regions, where such a hot and dry summer has not been known in 40 years.

The South Russian crop may be described, upon the whole, as average, yet there are disastrous shortages in the populous districts in the Ekaterinoslav government. An instance is cited of the utter destruction of about 40,000 acres of grain by hailstorms and the Heaslian fly. The same agencies have blighted large tracts of grain in the Taurida and Don country, and in the Bouban and Terck districts in Northern Caucasia.

The worst of all are the Volga provinces. The peasants of this vast region are already practically destitute. They have sold the cattle and horses they could not feed, and have consumed nearly their whole scanty stocks of food and grain. The Russian Minister of Ways and Communications is making active provision for the timely transportation of food, grain and other supplies from the south. Local authorities have been instructed to take instant measures for obviating the horror of the famine threatened for next winter.
