NEW BERN AS A SUMMER RESORT.

For the past two weeks the newspaper reports record maximum temperatures ranging from 93 to 108 degrees; in the cities north, west and south.

And during this same period the maximum temperature in New Bern was 89 degrees, and this only on one day, the average temperature being near 83 degrees.

This exemption from severe high temperatures, just now, is not an ordinary one for New Bern, for there are few days at any time in the year when the heat is unbearable and such records as are now being made at many points are unknown here.

The proximity of numerous rivers and large bodies of water is doubtless the cause of our equable temperature and the long reaches of pine forests have a modifying influence on the climate. Whatever the reason may be, the result is satisfactory to the citizens who may make this their home.

The nights are great feature of New Bern life for there is rarely one that is uncomfortable. As twilight changes in to night the temperature slowly sinks until it reaches a comfortable point for sleep. Those citizens, favored with apartments overlooking the river say that they never suffer from heat at night that there is always a breeze to be felt from the water, and the same cause serves to modify the climate in all parts of the town.

The point here made for New Bern as a summer resort is one of temperature because that is the engrossing theme these days in all parts of the country and people are trying to account for such records as 108 degrees in the shade by telling of the spots on the sun and other phenomena. There are other points that might be made but the question of heat is the telling one at present.

Diamonds in Meteorites. The largest iron meteorites come from the canyon Diablo, in Arizona, and were discovered about ten years ago. Of this famous "fall" Professor Ward, the natural history collector, has several large specimens and 20 or more smaller ones. The surface of the larger ones is covered with indentations or pits scooped out by a chisel. Sometimes holes were thus bored entirely through these openings that the specimens may be suspended for more effective display. The canyon Diablo meteorites are remarkable in being one of the two known kinds that contain diamonds. The diamonds are black and microscopic and have no commercial value. New York Post.
