STATE BOARD HEALTH.

Find Morganton Insane Asylum Good Condition.

Also Sewerage Blowing Rock Sanitary. Uniform Freight Rates on Cotton. Buildings Remodeled Wake Forest College, Cotton Crop.

Raleigh, July 29.—Dr. G. G. Thomas, the president, and Dr. R. H. Lewis the secretary, of the State board of health, have returned from Morganton, where they inspected the insane asylum and school for deaf-mutes and found the condition of both excellent. They also went to Blowing Rock and inspected the sewerage of the hotels there. This is taken off by a stream. They decided that this was not injurious to the health of the community. By a special act of 1898, this authority to decide was vested in this board.

The corporation commission will on Thursday have an important meeting to decide the question of uniform freight rates all over the State on cotton.

Next week the corporation commissioners go to the extreme western counties to confer with county officers as to tax assessments, etc.

At Wake Forest college the oldest of all the buildings is being remodeled, at a cost of \$5,000. It will when thus improved contain 48 living rooms and 9 recitation rooms.

Gov. Aycock left early this morning for Wilson, where his oldest son is sick and thence goes to Wrightsville to inspect and review the 2nd regiment at Camp Aycock.

Cotton on sandy land in this part of the State is about worthless.

The trustees of Wake Forest college meet here tomorrow to decide as to the establishment of the departments of medicine and pharmacy this year.

There are no sick inmates of the Soldiers Home. All were able to be at meals today.

There are 27 inmates of the Catholic Orphanage here. These are in charge of 8 priests and 6 sisters of charity.

BALL PLAYER ARRESTED.

Manager Bryan Objects to Barney Kain Enticing Away Reddy Foster. Special to Journal.

Raleigh, July 29.—"Barney" Kain, other name Charles Kain, who was captain of the late Richmond base ball team and now with the Darlington, S. C. team, was arrested here last night on a warrant sworn out by Manager Bryan of the Tarboro team, charging him with violating a State law of 1898, well-known as the "Peg Leg Williams Act," by endeavoring to entice away "Reddy" Foster one of the team, a violation of the law of contract.

The Tarboro team arrived here yesterday afternoon, and in the evening Kain turned up at the railway station. It is charged that he sent a man named Thomas after Foster. His arrest quickly followed.

The papers were drawn by James H. Pou, who is the attorney for the athletic association, and \$100 bond was required for appearance at September term of Superior Court here. Kain was not jailed but was kept in custody of a deputy sheriff. As the pair walked about the streets this morning Kain attracted no little attention. Thomas, who went to see Foster, as "middleman" left last evening.

Money was telegraphed Kain from Darlington, S. C. and he deposited it for bail and left. Foster also went to Darlington, S. C.

Copious Rains in Kansas.

TOPEKA, July 28.—Copious rains have again fallen throughout Kansas today. All along the line of the Santa Fe to the western part of the State there were generous falls of moisture. In Topeka nearly two inches of rain fell today. This makes over four inches in the past three days. The farmers of the State will begin replanting their vegetables and will plant immense quantities of turnips, Kaffir corn and sorghum for forage. The ground is in excellent condition for these products now and plenty of rough feed for the coming winter is assured.
