REWARD OFFERED.

For Capture of Murderer of Child of Police of Shelby.

Effect of the New Pardon Rule. The Wadleigh Saw Mill Case. The Colby Yardlet. Underground Telephone Wires.

ALLBRIGHT, Aug. 5.—An executive reward of \$200 was offered today for Jim Lowery, a young negro who at Shelby at 1 o'clock yesterday morning murdered child of police R. S. Jones. The latter accompanied by a policeman, went to the house of a negro woman at which gambling was going on. Lowery opened the door and on the instant shot Jones. Lowery ran into the yard, Jones caught him and there was a desperate struggle. Lowery shot him. Jones died instantly and the murderer fled, hotly pursued. The town of Shelby offers \$200 reward.

Private Secretary Pearson says the good effect of Gov. Aycock's pardon rules, requiring publication of the fact that a pardon will be applied for is already apparent. Melega, a man connected at Tarboro, applied, and notice was published. Leading citizens now notify the Governor that they want to be heard in opposition to pardon and say it would be a gross error to grant one.

Under the new revenue act it is found that the increase in incomes in this city is over \$125,000.

A telegram from Wilson last night stated that Charles Aycock, the Governor's son, who is almost 18 years old, was in an extremely critical state, that left side was paralyzed and that he was not expected to live until this morning. News this morning is that death is hourly expected. His fever was higher and he was kept alive only by the medicine and stimulants.

Today the papers in what is known as the Wadleigh case came before Judge Parnell here, in the shape of a bill auxiliary to the bill in the western district of Virginia. The case favors title to a saw mill at Wilmington, thousands of acres of land in that section and lands in Virginia and Georgia. This property was ordered sold under a decree signed by Judge Paul, 18 months ago. The present bill is to confirm and protect the title to the property under that decree. The property involved is worth from \$200,000 to \$300,000. One branch of this case has been before the United States Supreme Court.

In the Colby damage suit, which was decided in June by the Supreme Court, but which comes up for a re-argument, the judgment entered is for \$13,500 with interest of \$2,500 total paid.

The Bell telephone company will spend \$10,000 here in putting its wires underground and in making other improvements.

John H. Boner, the poet, is now at Pungay Springs near here. He has consumption, but has improved considerably since his arrival from New York.

THOMASVILLE, Aug. 4.—The Lupton Chair Factory, one of the largest and probably the best equipped one of the state factories now running, was burned to the ground this afternoon, between 3 and 4 o'clock. The loss is between \$40,000 and \$100,000, one of the biggest fires in Thomastown.

MANAGER OF THE STRIKE.

The President of the Amalgamated Association Says That He Will Order Out Every Union Man in the Employ of the Steel Corporation.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 4.—"Within a week every union man and every union man at heart in the employ of the United States Steel Corporation will be asked to join in the strike, now being waged by the Amalgamated Association. We must settle whether unionism is to stand or fall. There will be no more conferences with the United States Steel Corporation, unless the meeting is asked for by the officials of that corporation. The Amalgamated Association will not request a peace meeting.

These and several other significant statements were made tonight by President Shaffer, of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, upon his return from the fruitless conference with J. Pierpont Morgan and others, in New York.

It is now a fight to the bitter finish between the great billion dollar steel trust and organized labor. Mr. Shaffer says that he is ready to employ every peaceable means within the power of man to win a victory. No quarter is to be given and none will be requested. The entire management of the battle has been placed in the hands of President Shaffer. He has absolute power to call out every man who is connected with the organization and he intends to do it. He is satisfied with the progress of the fight to date.
