RESPIRE GRANTED.

Governor Grants it to Council Under Sentence at Fayetteville.

RALEIGH, Aug. 9.—Mention was made yesterday of the application made by ex-judge E. K. Bryan of Wilmington to associate justice Douglas of the Supreme Court for a rehearing of the noted case of Lewis Council at Fayetteville Council having been convicted of rape and his execution having been ordered last Monday by the Governor. The Governor respite him to November 1, in order that the Supreme Court may pass on the case. The general rule is not to rehear State cases.

Judge Douglas in the Council case the decision of the court was a per curiam order, and that he has no hesitation in saying it is a proper case to be reheard, yet he feels great hesitation in ordering it to be docketed in view of the Supreme Court's decision in State vs. Jones, 89 N. C. reports. In that case the court held it had no power to entertain a petition to rehear a criminal action. He says it is but just to Council as well as to himself to say that that decision does not meet with his approval in spite of his respect and admiration for the great court which rendered it. He adds that it did not really satisfy the court itself. He refers to the exceptional circumstances at the trial of Lewis Council; to the fact that the jury rendered the verdict only after a distinct understanding among its members and the court that it should be coupled with a recommendation to mercy.
