### RALEIGH.

Sad News of the Death of the Governor's Son.

Alleged Claim Not Made by Worth. The A. & M. College Examination. At the University. A. Fine Class.

RALEIGH, Aug. 10.—A telephone message from Wilson announced the death of Charles Aycock, the Governor's oldest son, at 6 o'clock this morning, from Cerebro-spinal meningitis. He would have been 18 next October and was in his junior year at the University of North Carolina. He will be buried at Wilson at 5 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

Iredell Meares of Wilmington is here to see the United States district attorney regarding some titles to government land at Southport.

The State treasury today received a dividend on the 5 per cent bonds of the North Carolina railway \$90,000 and paid the New York interest on these, aggregating \$9,000.

Some one made the point that the finding by past legislative committees that ex-treasurer Worth's account were correct relieved him from liability for the stealings of his clerk, W. H. Martin. Not even the ex-treasurer's attorney makes any such claim, an official informs our correspondent.

The following applicants from this State for Peabody scholarships passed the examinations, the State superintendent of public instruction announces, Miss Lizzie Ferrell, of Clinton, 87 per cent; Walter R. Jones of Surry county, and Miss Madge White of Statesville, 85 per cent.

Great preparations for the State Fair are in progress. Gen. Cox, the President, says the list of attractions is the largest on record.

In the entrance examinations for scholarships at the Agricultural and Mechanical College here, held in the various counties, 83 passed out of 100. At the examinations at the college each month about the same number will be admitted. The opening is September 4th.

A dispensation is granted by Grand Master B. S. Royster for a new lodge at Aulander, Bertie county.

E. L. Ellison of Chestertown, Md., will be the director at the gymnasium at the State University, Charles O. Jenkins is the new football coach. Both he and Ellison are Yale graduates.

The record of grades made on examinations by the freshmen class at the University shows it is probably the best class which ever entered there. Over 80 completed their work with credit and a third of all passed without a failure.

### North Carolina History Served in Delicious Bits

Some of the titles will give one something of the flavor of the southern life: Two Indian Boys, Wash to a Strange Land, Loss of a Silver Cup, Isaac's Search for Gold, The Lord of Honoak, Story of Virginia Dare, The Tardy Governor, John Lawson and the Alligators, The Carolina Pirate, Corcoran's in a Hornet's Nest, General Greene Without a Penny, etc.

### THE OLD VETS.

Report of the Reunion at Bayboro Resolutions. Officers Elected. Delegates and Alternates. Speaking and Dinner.

Headquarters Henry L. Wyatt Camp, No. 1248, United Confederate Veterans. Henry L. Wyatt Camp met at the Court House at Bayboro, in their annual reunion on Thursday, August 8th, 1901.

The meeting was called to order by Lieutenant Commander B. E. Nobles, in the absence of the Captain, Commander. Prayer by the Chaplain Rev. T. A. Moxingo. Roll was called and 35 members answered to their names, 18 were absent, some came in later, five were reported as having died since our last annual meeting, August 9, 1901. To wit: J. J. Fornes, Co. B 67th regiment, N. C. troops; H. D. Armstrong, Co. A. 32d regiment; T. E. S. Paine, Co. F. 33d regiment; Wm. F. Midyett, Co. I. 66th regiment, and Wm. Potter, Co. B. 67th regiment.

The following committee was appointed to draft resolutions on their death: W. T. Caho, T. A. Moxingo and J. M. Caroon, who reported the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, It has pleased our great Capt. Commander and Divine Master, Almighty God, to transfer from our Camp on this side of the River of Death to His Camp on the other side to mingle with the thousands of our fallen comrades who have gone before, we bow with humble submission to His divine commands and recognize the fact that as in the brief period of one year one twelfth of the strength of this Camp has answered to its last roll call here, so will the last one of us have answered in a few more years, probably in another decade the brief period of ten more years, there may not be one of us to meet here and transact the business of this Camp. Surely some of us will be gone to join our comrades in their Camp across the river. Therefore be it.

Resolved, That in the death of our comrades, Fornes, Armstrong, Paine, Midyett and Potter, that this Camp has lost five of its beloved and faithful members, who in the dark days of war were vigilant sentinels, true, loyal and faithful soldiers, and in the years since the close of the war, they have been loyal citizens, faithful to every trust reposed in them, and the county, State and country have lost five good, law-abiding and peaceful citizens.

Resolved, That these resolutions be spread upon the records of this Camp to perpetuate their memory. That a copy be sent to each of the families of the deceased and a copy sent to the New Bern Journal for publication.

W. T. CAHO, T. A. MOXINGO, J. M. CAROON, Committee.

The resolutions were reported and unanimously adopted. Twenty-six members came forward and paid up their dues for the year ending April 1st, 1902. Comrade Kelly Burch, late of Co. B, 67th, Regt. N. C. Troops applied for admission into this Camp, paid his dues and was admitted. The hour for election of officers having arrived, Comrade Redden R. Dowdy moved that all the present officers be re-elected, which motion was amended, by excepting Comrade H. D. Armstrong, vidette dead and First Color guard, Noah Ride, who is not a regular member of this Camp, as amended and adopted, and the following officers were re-elected, to wit, Capt. Commander, G. B. Attmore, 1st Lt. J. D. Riggs, 2nd Lt. R. F. McGotter, 3rd Lt. J. B. Erault, 4th Lt. B. E. Nobles, Adjutant, W. T. Caho, Quartermaster, John W. Aldridge, Commissary, W. H. Sawyer, Chaplain, Rev. T. A. Moxingo, Treasurer, R. D. Jones, Sergeant Major, Geo. E. Dixon, Officer of the Day, J. O. Baxter, Color Sergeant, Gen. T. Cahoon, 2nd Color Guard, J. M. Caroon, Comrade, L. H. Perry was elected Vidette in place of Comrade H. D. Armstrong dead, and Comrade W. P. Cahoon was elected 1st Color Guard in place of Noah Ride, not a member of this camp.

The following men were elected delegates to attend the Division and Brigade meetings at the Reunion August 14 to 17th, inclusive at Wightsville, N. C. Comrade, T. A. Moxingo, Geo. S. Attmore, W. T. Caho as delegates, and Comrade, J. D. Riggs, L. H. Perry and John S. Cason, as Alternates.

The following executive committee was re-elected, to wit: W. T. Caho, W. H. Sawyer and Dr. G. S. Attmore.

Comrade H. H. Dewey of New Bern Camp, No. 1185 was called for and he made a short and appropriate speech to the Camp. Dr. R. E. Dixon, the orator, having arrived, reported by Capt. K. H. Jones and X. M. Hoxe of New Bern Camp, No. 1185, were invited to seats with us and Dr. R. E. Dixon the orator was introduced to the audience by the Adjutant, W. T. Caho, Dr. Dixon then delivered a most delightful and entertaining address. The following resolutions were then adopted.

Resolved, That visiting ones of thanks are due and are hereby given to our Comrades and Brother-Injuns, Dr. R. E. Dixon for his most delightful, entertaining, grand, noble and eloquent address and may God's blessings always attend also.

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Comrade W. T. Caho stated the fol-

lowing resolution which was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, General Cullen A. Battle, a beloved comrade who has so often met with us for our pleasure and edification, always responding cheerfully to our call; and while he is now distant from us in another State and cannot be with us to day, his memory lingers with us and will so long as there is one surviving member of this Camp, and our love and admiration goes out to and follows him, wherever he may be. And as an appreciation of him and the services he has rendered this Camp in the past, and to his country upon the field of battle therefore be it resolved:

That though absent he is remembered and his memory cherished by each one of this camp, and may God's blessings attend him through life, and while we live in the hope that we may meet him here again in our reunions of this camp, but if God should will it otherwise, we all hope to meet with him in that grand and glorious last reunion beyond the River.

Resolved that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the dear comrade at his home in Petersburg, Virginia, and to the New Bern Journal at New Bern for publication, and the same be spread upon the records of this camp.

Dinner being in readiness the meeting of the Camp adjourned until our next annual reunion the 2nd Thursday in August 1902, unless sooner called together by our commanding officer.

The Veterans, their families and visitors then repaired to the grove where a bountiful dinner was spread for all, prepared by the good ladies and our efficient commissary department. The Camp extends an unanimous vote of thanks to all the ladies who so kindly assisted in providing and preparing the dinner, request that they continue to meet with us in our re-unions.
