### RALEIGH.

**Suspected Incendiary Fire at Wilmington Looked Into.**

**More Heavy Rain, Moving at Soldier's Home, Sall Test Farms.**  
The Governor's message in his message nearly repaired.

RALEIGH, Aug. 13.—Insurance Commissioner J. R. Young left today for Wilmington to investigate a fire which it is suspected was the work of an incendiary.

The board of education accepts the school text book contract of Silver, Burdette & Co., and the Governor will issue a supplemental contract.

James Maglieni, for many years in charge of the Seaboard Air-Line shops here, and recently transferred to the Richmond shops, has returned here, having been displaced.

Heavy rains set in last night and this morning were excessive. Rain was not needed, nevertheless there has not enough fallen to damage crops, which have developed remarkably during the past three weeks.

The inmates of the old main dormitory building at the Soldiers' Home are moving out, in order that the building may be torn down. All the good material in it will be used in the construction of the new building.

Insurance Commissioner Young today paid \$1,000 to the State treasury. His department is proving a very profitable one to the State.

The soil-test farm in Edgecombe county will be re-located, in order to make it more accessible to the public. The present farm is several miles from Tarboro. There will eventually be such farms in the State, one for each Congressional district.

Governor Aycock was at his office this morning. He is deeply touched by the great expression of sympathy by the people of his State at the untimely death of his son.

Over three tons of the money due the State, by the bondsmen of ex-Senator Treasurer Worth has been paid into the treasury, to make good the Martin election.

A number of the minor railroads have paid into the treasury their privilege tax. The Southern pays the largest amount, \$328,000, and has made settlement.

The Clayton cotton mill at Clayton, began operation today. It is a 5000 spindle mill, and will make yarn.

Adjutant General Rogers is here. By reason of military family he was unable to go to Wilmington to see the First regiment in camp. He says regarding the equipment of the three regiments: "They were very satisfactory in all respects." Over 1000 officers and men were in camp. The First regiment is claimed to be the finest of all. Its Colonel and thirty of its 46 officers were in the war with Spain, so were nearly all the non-commissioned officers and a third of the privates.

#### More Stolen Gold Recovered.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 12.—It was stated at the office of the Holly Receiving Company today, that a force of divers, under the management of the Pinkertons had to day taken \$25,000 worth of gold from the spot where it was hidden by William Mackay \$400,000 already recovered.

It is expected that the remainder of the stolen treasure, amounting to \$80,000, will be recovered in the next few days. What is still detained by the officers but has not been generally charged with the crime. The fact that he has not been charged with any crime lends additional weight to the belief that he will be readily dealt with for confessing the crime and pointing out the spot where he secured the loot.

A lively fight is expected between the disbelievers over the returned money and the matter eventually may be taken to the courts for settlement.

#### WEATHER FAVORABLE.

Weekly Crop Bulletin Shows Improvement in Cotton, Corn and Tobacco. Rainfall Above Normal.

For week ending Monday, August 13, 1901.—The past week was characterized by very heavy rains from Monday to Wednesday, inclusive, which were followed by fair, warm and favorable weather. The rainfall averaged nearly 1.00 above the normal, but was very beneficial in nearly all the counties of eastern district, along the northern border of the State, and in the extreme west, where the drought was generally broken and crops materially improved; in the southern portion, however, the heavy rains washed cotton and corn lands badly in some localities, and resulted in heavy freshets with overflow of lowlands and some damage to stocked lands and other crops. The floods in the larger rivers culminated on the 9th. The temperature averaged about 2° above the normal for the week. On the whole the reports of correspondents were generally favorable and indicate a promising prospect, as far as may now be possible after a season so uniformly bad as the present one.

Cotton improved generally during the week; late cotton was revived, is vigorous and will reach sufficient size to give a good yield with a late autumn; old cotton seems to be holding its fruit well and very few reports of shedding have been received, but the bolls are still scattering on the plants. It may be said that in some sections where the crop was well worked cotton will be good, in most others fair to very poor. Corn has come out better than expected; a great deal of corn was planted very late, and it now looks very well, except on bottomlands, where crops are practically non-existent; fodder is ripening. Some improvement in the growth of late tobacco occurred; cutting and curing continued during the week. Field peas and sweet potato vines are fine. Peasants promise a full crop and will be ready for digging soon. Turning land for wheat is progressing slowly; turnips are being sown and the seeds are sprouting nicely. Special reports on the apple crop indicate a poor yield almost everywhere; apples are knobby and not well formed, are rotting or falling before maturity, and the need of spraying was manifest this season. The early hay crop was saved in good condition, but rains and freshets injured some of the late crop; a large amount of post-vine hay will be made later in the season.

#### Many Horses Dying.

RALEIGH, N. C., August 13.—The Department of Agriculture at Raleigh has received a letter from Fairfield, Hyde county, which stated that stamping was prevailing there among stock, with fatal effect. Fully seventy-five horses have died at Fairfield. At Swan Quarter, in the same county, the disease has killed many horses.

Dr. Petty, a veterinarian of Winston will this week investigate the epidemic among the horses and mules. Dr. Tait Butler, the new State veterinarian, will hardly arrive here before next week.
