THOMAS CONFIDENT.

He Gives Good Reasons For the
Large Vote Received.

Third Lysching This Year. Work Done by Geovietta, Charles-ton Exposition. Late Opening of Cotton Bolls.

Rahmon, August 22--The lynching of the negro at McPattand yesterday for rape is the third in the State this year. It is the first since Gov. Aycock made the formal announcement that in future he would offer \$500 reward for lynchers. It is presumed that he will in this make official announcement of such reward. He is greatly concerned about the lynching spirit and to find how strong it is.

The convicts in this State have in the past 27 years built 26 railroads, with a total of 1,457 miles, or about two fifths of the whole mileage in North Carolina. The estimated value of the work is \$3,000 a mile on an average.

The news that H. M. Flagler, the Florida multi-millionaire, will next Saturday marry Miss Mary Lily Keran, as announced here this morning, was read with interest, though the announcement was expected.

State Superintendent of public instruction Tom left today for Concord, where he will tomorrow speak at an educational rally. Two of the companies of his old regiment were from that county.

Congressman Charles H. Thomas is here. He is in excellent health, and says he is entirely confident that he will win in the contest which John E. Fowler, Populist, is making for his seat. He says that on account of Republican hostility to Fowler the votes of many influential men of that party were cast for him (Thomas) while of course he got the solid Democratic vote. He further got the option null vote and the zealous support of the Gold Democrats. Fowler's prospects appear to be very meagre indeed.

The cases for this State's extensive exhibit at the Charleston exposition, which are being made here out of native oak, are nearly completed. This State has undoubtedly secured the best space at the exposition and its display will be all the more imposing by reason of the fact that it will be collective.
