THE NEGRO MUST ASSIST IN MAINTENANCE OF LAW.

It is not only in the matter of outrages committed by his own race, that the negro must condemn and join in crushing but in minor or vital matters, the negro must set himself against, and assist the law in punishing the criminals, instead of harboring and shielding the guilty persons.

Newspaper reports tell of negroes joining the whites in visiting swift punishment upon offending negroes who have committed outrages, but in the lesser crimes, petty larceny and other offenses, the negro criminal is made much of by his fellows, and the matter of having or not having a law and order is no bar to his reception or standing among his fellows.

Let there be a full delivery, and the escaped negro is again sheltered and hidden by negro sympathizers.

And yet this protection makes the parties giving the shelter liable to arrest, although arrests are seldom made, if the escaped prisoner can be recaptured.

Minor lawlessness no doubt leads to greater lawlessness and crime, and it is this condemning small crimes, and refusing to receive the offenders, that is necessary, if the negro is to gain personal respect, or the regard of the whites.

To work out of the shadow of criminality, which hangs over the entire negro race, the deserving colored people must place themselves firmly upon the side of law and order, and absolutely refuse to countenance any action among their race which borders on disorder or law breaking.

There must be no race feeling among them, that shall protect the criminal because of race, but instead crime, be it great or small in its nature, must receive positive disapproval, and the criminal must be set forth out of their midst, to be dealt with according to the law.

If this shall be done, then there need be no menace to the peace between blacks and whites.

The law will determine the crime and its penalty, and the white people will not feel that the negro is a danger to society, and that society's protection is to be found in extermination or deportation.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Let a small box of lime in the pantry, and it will help to keep it dry and the air pure. Soda should never be used for washing, and if they are kept in good condition they should be neither mangled nor ironed. Mud stains can usually be removed from silk by rubbing with a piece of flannel. If the stain proves obstinate, rub with a piece of linen saturated with alcohol. If your window glass is lacking in brilliancy, clean it with a liquid made of alcohol and whiting. A little of this mixture will remove specks and impart a high luster to the glass. To render feathers white immerse them for a short time in naphtha or benzine. Rinse in a second dish of the same and dry in the open air. Then bleach by exposing in a box to the vapor of burning sulphur in a moist atmosphere. Good clear starch is easily made. Wet the lump starch with cold water, stir till smooth, pour on boiling water and cook till clear. It takes a quart of boiling water to "clear" two table-spoonfuls of lump starch. If too thick, thin with blue water.
