TOOK REVENGE IN FIRE.

Disastrous ending of attempt to introduce English Customs.

DEWEY, CO., August 30.—Inspired by antagonism to the English method of keeping guards on his extensive property to prevent poaching, and this spirit being greatly intensified by the killing of a ranchman for failing in the fox-hunting season, a small party of men destroyed practically the entire establishment belonging to William Radcliffe, an Englishman, at the grand Mesa lakes, north of Delta. The last act of depredation was committed on Sunday morning, when 30 armed cowboys set fire to the large fish hatchery, the only remaining building on the grounds.

When Mr. Radcliffe first purchased the property he stocked the waters with fish and the wood with game and installed several guards to prevent depredations. The residents bitterly opposed the innovation, and insisted that they had the right to fish and hunt where they pleased.

After repeated warnings one of the guards shot and killed a ranchman whom he found fishing in a lake on the property. Vengeance was vowed by the neighboring residents, and the guards sought safety in flight, leaving only one or two caretakers. The damage is placed at \$40,000.

To Populate Alaska.

TACOMA, WASH., August 30.—The Pacific Coast Steamship Company and the old transportation companies operating in Alaska are preparing to start a far-reaching movement having for its object the settlement of the valleys of Southern Alaska with tens of thousands of sturdy immigrants from Norway, Sweden and other Northern European countries.

Recent experiments, together with Government reports, show that all hardy grains thrive in Alaska and that potatoes and other vegetables can be matured south of the Yukon river. Weather statistics have been obtained showing that the country is more favorable for settlers than Manitoba and Northern Dakota. Another favorable feature is the fact that the coast of Alaska abounds in salmon fisheries similar to those of Norway.

Gloomy Outlook for Strikers

Pittsburg, August 30.—While there is no change in the steel strike situation, more transpired to day calculated to produce results in the near future. The conference between the Ray View committee and the Associated Steelworkers of the United States, which was held at the Hotel Biltmore, resulted in a settlement of the editorial in The Labor World, calling for the imprisonment of President Chester, all indicate that the crisis is approaching and that an important change in affairs is not far distant. What the outcome will be no man can tell. The details of the conference of the Ray View committee and the Associated Steelworkers have never yet been divulged by either party, but the fact that the committee is here at all would indicate that the Ray View strikers are uneasy. The general belief is that the main object of the committee's visit was to arrange some compromise.

OFFICIALS SLOW.

Reports From a Number of Counties to Departments Lacking.

Old Vets Helping to Build. Labor Day in Raleigh. Corporations Must Report. The Anson County Lynchers.

RALEIGH, Aug. 31.—The delay of officials of various counties in sending in reports is one of the great troubles of the State officers. As yet the treasurers of Bladen, Iredell, Robeson, Rockingham, Stokes, Swain and Yancey have failed to make reports to the State superintendent of public instruction, while the county superintendents of Craven, Haywood, Martin and Mitchell have not sent in reports. As to Mitchell all the records were swept away by the great May freshet which nearly ruined the town of Bakersville and caused some loss of life.

A number of the inmates of the soldiers home here are at work, aiding the contractor's force in putting up the new main building. Of course they are paid for their work.

The public buildings here will all be closed next Monday, Labor Day. There will be a parade and speeches. There are three speakers, labor commissioner Varner, ex-Congressman Nichols and State treasurer Lacy. The speeches will be at the fair grounds, where there will also be a baseball game. Mr. Nichols is the oldest member of Raleigh typographical union, the oldest labor organization in this city or State.

State Auditor Dixon says that 100 corporations have not sent in their appraisements of capital stock. He today sent out the last notice to them. If they do not send in the appraisements he will be required by the new revenue act, make the appraisement himself.

President Winston of the Agricultural and Mechanical College here today made arrangements to accommodate 50 more students. He says that even after this at least 50 will probably be turned off next month.

As yet the following counties have failed to send in their pension applications: Cumberland, Halifax, Currituck and Burke. The State pension board had arranged to meet last Monday but deferred the meeting until next Monday, as all the applications were not in hand.

It is not probable that a reward for the Anson county lynchers will be immediately offered, as there is natural interest in what the next grand jury in the county will do.

PLENTY TO EAT.

Crops Are Improved. Late Corn Fair and Cotton Better. One Cause of Success. A Pleasant Event.

Bellair, August 31.—Crops improving. Fodder saving, etc. With all the complaints of destruction of crops by heat, cold, wet and dry, there seems likely to be enough in our great land for our great population if we are to credit reports current, and even down to the small Bellair vicinity, crops are so improved that we hardly see one man in ten now, that has really made up his mind to perish next winter for want of something to eat, but such a tribe could be seen and heard too, about the last of July. Old corn is not good but young or late corn is doing well, with a few exceptions cotton has improved very much and even where water stood ten consecutive days in July, there is now a prospect of good cotton ten or twelve bolls to the stalk, and occasionally more. Peas are doing far better than any farmer hoped for a month since. Sweet potatoes are doing fairly well but not as early as usual grass is also much improved, in fact it is king, and has been most of this summer. One farmer had to mow off a heavy crop of grass to find a few onion sets which were clean the first of July. Rutabaga and other turnips are up and growing finely under these fine local showers. Surely this has been a better week for growing things than saving fodder, much of the latter having been damaged by rains. Some complaints of rotten potatoes of full planting. Some are coming up slowly two weeks from planting.

Government Expert For Hyde.

WASHINGTON, August 30.—Hon. John B. Small called this afternoon at the Department of Agriculture relative to the fatal horse disease prevailing in Hyde, Beaufort and Pamlico counties. Mr. Small explained that about 300 horses have recently died in Hyde county alone. Dr. Salmon, chief of the bureau of animal industry, promises to send down an expert Monday if he can possibly find a man not otherwise engaged.

Colored Graded School.

The New Bern Colored Graded School opens Tuesday. Rev. W. Geo. Avant is the Principal, who is a graduate of Oberlin, Ohio College. The colored school opens about a month earlier than the white school and closes earlier in the spring.
