### PENITENTIARY REPORT.

Expected to be Made Public in Two Weeks.

**Convicts on Railroads.** S. A. L. Enclingers, Few Cases Small Fox Gen. Carr Address Veterans. **Rewards for Murderers.** Delegates to Buffalo Exposition.  
 RALEIGH, Sept. 5.—At the meeting of the penitentiary directors it was stated that in about two weeks the report of conditions January 1, April 1 and August 1 would be ready. It was also stated that possibly the penitentiary would pay out this year, that is support itself, but that probably it would lack \$10,000 of doing so. The report states when the new board took charge were \$48,000 less than the fiscal management claimed and reported them to be. It was stated yesterday, 500 convicts are next month to be put at work grading in the mountain division of the "Three C's" road. It is now the purpose to put 400 there by the end of January. Only the convicts on the "Caledonia" State farm near Weldon and those on contract near Asheboro will be retained.  
 This week Henry C. Bridgers, who is building a railway eastward from Tabor, gave up 190 convicts. These are now employed near there on a short contract for timber cutting, until October 1, when they will be transferred to a camp about 12 miles from Marion, on the "Three C's". At the Caledonia farm now a large force of convicts is rebuilding the dykes broken by the great freshet in May. The dykes on that farm are also to be reopened. Excellent progress is being made in the rebuilding of the great dykes and by the end of this month that work will probably be finished.  
 The State pension board is at work. Its task is far larger and more arduous than ever before, owing to the great increase in the number of applications. The burden of the work falls upon State Auditor Dixon.  
 The State superintendent of public instruction today received a copy of "North Carolina History Stories," written by W. C. Allen superintendent of the public school at Waynesville, and published very attractively by B. F. Johnson & Co.  
 Inquiry was made as to the number of seaboard Air Line engineers in Raleigh. It is found that 18 own their homes, that 91 rent homes and that 10 other engineers stop here who claim Richmond or Norfolk as home.  
 Dr. R. H. Lewis, secretary of the State board of health, says that at present there are very few cases of small pox in the State, but that of course there will be numerous cases again when the cold weather comes. The annual report is not yet made, but it will no doubt show a large gain for the season of 1900-1901 over that of 1899-1900.  
 During August the mean temperature here was 75 degrees, which is 1 degree above the average. The rainfall was no less than 11.81 inches, while the average is only 4.75 inches, the excess being therefore 7.06.  
 At Jonesboro today Geo. Julian S. Carr addressed the Jones county Confederate Veterans. Next week at Red Springs, he will address the Veterans of Robeson county.  
 It is said here that Edward Wood will be a formidable candidate for the Democratic nomination for Congress from the 1st district.  
 Gov. Aycock offers \$500 reward for Fletcher Hopkins and \$500 for Lucius Hopkins, his son. These men assassinated Senator Charles E. Kirby. They went to his house, hid him out and shot him to death with the caliber 45 revolver. This crime occurred in Haywood county.  
 There were this morning 275 students at the Agricultural and Mechanical college. Today was opening day, but it is deferred until tomorrow. After this week no more classes are expected.  
 Governor Aycock's at Seven Springs and will remain there several days. He needs a rest.  
 The Governor has appointed delegates to the national good roads committee at Buffalo, Sept. 16-21, among them being George D. Green, William Dunn, H. Well, John H. Smith, J. A. Holmes. He has also appointed delegates to the Farmers National Congress at St. Louis, Mo. Oct. 1-10, among those being Joseph Bell, W. R. Capshaw, George J. Yea, R. H. Ricks, John S. Cunningham, J. J. Laughlin, W. R. Cox, W. F. Massey, B. W. Kilgore.

### County Commissioners Proceedings.

The Board met at the court house, New Bern, N. C., at 10:30 a. m., September 2nd 1901, it being the regular monthly meeting of said Board.  
 Present: Commissioners Jones, Fulcher and Wood.  
 Ordered that Calvin McIntosh, be, and is hereby allowed \$1.00 in rations, and Alonzo Fulcher be requested to furnish same and send bill to the county.  
 Ordered that the bank stock listed to P. H. Pelletier be stricken from the list for the year 1900, it not being liable under the act of 1899.  
 On motion the matter of Jas T. Barnes was referred to the clerk of the Board with power to act.  
 On motion the report of the Grand Jury was received.  
 Ordered that W. A. Blount of Seven Springs be notified to appear before the Board and show cause why \$10 acres of land bought of Mrs. G. J. Dudley should not have been listed by him.  
 On motion Board took recess until September 3rd, at 9 o'clock.  
 The Board met at 9 o'clock a. m., September 3rd, 1901, pursuant to recess.  
 Present: Commissioners Jones, Fulcher, Baxter, Wadsworth and Wood.  
 The auditing committee presented their report which was adopted and ordered spread upon the minutes.  
 On motion it is ordered that K. R. Jones be, and hereby is appointed proxy to represent the county of Craven at all meetings of the stockholders of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad Company with power under him to appoint one or more proxies.  
 Ordered that Alex Justice be, and is hereby relieved of poll tax for 1900, he not having been a resident at that time.  
 Ordered that A. M. Williams be instructed to furnish Lazarus Jackson one dollar per month.  
 Ordered that the property belonging to Isaac H. Smith, listed but not valued, for taxation for 1900, be and the same is hereby valued upon the tax list for the year 1900 as follows:  
 One store house \$400 00  
 One house and lot 350 00  
 " " on Middle st. 1850 00  
 Three houses and lots 600 00  
 Two houses and lots Jerkins alley 600 00  
 House and lot Cedar and Physic 400 00  
 House and lot Queen st. 800 00  
 House and lot Carmon st. 75 00  
 And the sheriff is instructed to collect said tax according to said valuation.  
 Ordered by the Board that the tax certificate for the sale of the land of Olan. A. Squires for the year 1899, be and the same is hereby transferred to G. W. Hamilton, he having paid all costs and taxes due on the same.  
 E. E. Bryan presented his bond as cotton weigher for Craven county for the ensuing two years, which upon examination was found sufficient in its surety and accepted and ordered spread upon the record of official bonds.  
 Ordered that Sheriff Kinsey's time for settlement be and is hereby extended until the first Monday in October, 1901, and Commissioners K. R. Jones and J. J. Baxter are hereby appointed a committee to examine the books of the Sheriff's office with power to employ such assistance as they may need and report to the next meeting of the Board.  
 Ordered by the Board that the thanks of the Board be and are hereby extended to Hon. G. R. Thomas for presenting to the court a history of the war between the States.  
 The regular monthly bills were allowed.  
 The Chairman and Commissioner Baxter were appointed a committee to examine and receive the tax list for 1901, with power to turn over the same to the sheriff.  
 On motion it is ordered that Isaac H. Smith be allowed to settle his taxes, less \$1000.00 of solvent credits, being his debts and given in through error.  
 Daniel L. Roberts, Treasurer, presented his official report which was accepted and ordered spread upon the minutes.  
 On motion Board adjourned.
