MORE MONEY.

Trinity College Gets Gifts On Benefactor's Day.

The Effect of Freshets on Bare Lands. The Roanoke Island Gathering. Seaboard Air Line's New Plan.

RALPHIGH, Oct. 2--At the annual meeting at Trinity college this evening, in celebration of "Benefactor's Day," New gifts aggregating \$81,000 were announced.

At the close of his address Bishop Hendrix announced additional gifts just made as follows: Washington Duke \$25,000 for central heating plant.

It was the first holiday of the fall session and in commemoration of the gifts made to the college, it was one year ago that Mr. Washington Duke gave his last gift to the college.

Gov. Aycock is advised of the capture of Victor Hilliard, the horse thief, whose specialty was hiring horses, driving them long distances and selling them to farmers.

The State geologist is especially investigating the effect of freshets upon valleys unprotected by trees and those of the same size and configuration which are protected. He finds a great difference. He says the abandonment of agricultural low lands in the South during the past 25 years shows the baneful effects of deforesting.

In the Supreme Court yesterday the very important case of ex-conductor Cooley vs. the Southern R. R. was re-argued. This is the case which was decided at last term but in which Justice Douglas gave leave for re-argument.

The fact that this State will, under the auspices and direction of the State Literary and Historical Association celebrate on Roanoke Island next year will arouse general interest. It is proposed to have a great gathering there--perhaps July 16. For some unknown reason there was not in 1884 any notice of the tri-centennial of the first landing at Roanoke.

VOICE OF THE PEOPLE.

Suggests a Pillory Law.

EDITOR JOURNAL--Your editorial in Journal of the 1st inst, upon the said and prospective condition of the poor negro, impels this writing. Years of observation justifies concurrent opinion with the views, ("appropo") of Judge Simpson Baldwin of the Supreme Court of Connecticut, who in an able speech, advocated a revival of the "Pillory Law" in Connecticut; and the next Legislature did pass a law for giving "10 to 30 lashes," for all crimes, save those of murder, arson, and rape. The Judge took the solid ground, that the penitentiary is simply an "Asylum," for hundreds of base law breakers, who the tax payers of the state had to feed, clothe and shelter, and make comfortable both winter and summer, and have a doctor at their call. Let me ask, does not these plain facts apply to North Carolina? Does she not need a law closing the doors to law breakers, especially of the minor class? Does she not need to follow Connecticut's example, and arrange to administer the proper "Pillories" to evil doers?

An old gentleman at my elbow said that in his early day, this 10 to 30 and 90 Pillories, was used in North Carolina, and it never had to be administered a second time to same culprit. It was a final cure. He added that Little Delaware, never has repealed her "Pillory Law" and statistics show that crimes are 78 per cent less in Delaware, than in any other State in the Union.

This writer, while in New York City visited the Tombs Court, on a Sunday morning, with a lawyer friend. The room was crowded by culprits, and policemen. No. 24 was called and answered by policeman, who brought forward a dumphy Irishman. The Judge asked, what's his offence, "drunk, and broke a bottle on side walk" said the policeman. Two months on Blackwell Island said the Judge, to pick oakum. Dumphy's countenance gloomed, and while scratching his head, said "kant yer honor, please make it four months, the winter is coming on."

This evidently is a case in point applicable to North Carolina, and there is but few, if any counties that have not sent the same law breakers, more than once to the asylum home for culprits. Not long since I read that a negro murderer, (I think from Charlotte) was sent to spend thirty years in the (so-called) penitentiary, of course he is to be fed, clothed, and made comfortable both winter and summer, and have an M. D. at his call. All at the expense of the tax payers of "our Beloved Old North Carolina." 'Tis hoped, that every white man, will aid in urging the next Legislature, to give proper attention and just consideration to the "Asylum" matter, and follow the example set before us by "Staid Old Connecticut."

I'll only now add, that possibly I may have "hallooed before getting out of the woods." Some "Sambos" may see the point, and a score or more of them, commit law-violation on a scale that will result in their being sent to the State "Asylum," where doubtless they will find food, clothing, etc. in a comfortable winter home; or perhaps for a longer period.
