**RALEIGH.**

Railway Work to Be Pushed by Convict Labor.

New Building at Oxford Asylum. Cloth Covered School Books. Seaboard Air-Line Inspection. Pension List Complete.

RALEIGH, Oct. 10.—The finishing touches are now being given the specimens of North Carolina woods to be sent to the Charleston Exposition. There are about 150 specimens. The treatment of many of these is novel and artistic and gives new ideas of the possibilities.

Work has begun on the new industrial building at the Oxford Orphan Asylum. One of the trustees says industrial work is to be made an even greater feature of the life there.

Robinson's circus was here today and the usual throngs of people from the country came in. The short crops and bad year were put out of mind for one day at least.

The penitentiary authorities intend to put every available convict on railway construction, as soon as the crops can be harvested. The rebuilding of the great dykes on the Roanoke river, is practically completed. The lease on the "Tillery" farm expires this year. This will leave only the "Anson" farm under lease, and this year the latter farm is only nominally operated, about a dozen convicts being there.

The State superintendent of public instruction today issued a circular letter to county superintendents, recommending the purchase of text books bound in cloth rather than those in paper bindings as the difference in cost is but small and the cloth-bound books are far more durable.

Chairman McNeill of the corporation commission says the commission will not inspect the Seaboard Air Line just now but will go over it soon. It is hardly possible for it to investigate the recent accidents. That would require summoning witnesses, etc. If the investigation of an accident were instantly made something of value might be ascertained. For this reason there will be merely a very careful inspection.

Attorney General Gilmer, who has been very successful as a fruit-grower at Waynesville, Haywood county has sent his superb specimens of apples from his orchards. He sold his crop on the trees to buyers who on the spot barreled the apples and shipped them north.

The auditor has not yet completed the revision of the pension lists. As was stated some days ago the State board of pensioners has finished his work, and the delayed applicants, which came in too late, will have to go over until next year.

The Golf club, which has its links on the Cameron fields, between St. Mary's College and the Agricultural and Mechanical College, is about to begin its season. In compliance to Col. Bennham Cameron it takes its name.

Rockefeller, the Standard Oil magnate, was celebrated this morning at 11.30 o'clock in the ballroom of the tea-house, an attractive structure on the estate of Senator Aldrich at Warwick Neck, about 30 miles from Providence.

It is said that the bridegroom is prospectively the wealthiest young man in the world.

**McKinley Postal Cards.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Edwin G. Madden, Acting Postmaster-General, today announced that the department had decided to have the likeness of President McKinley appear on the next issue of postal cards.

Under the new contract these cards will be issued shortly after December 1. The head of McKinley will replace that of Jefferson, in use for some years on the one cent domestic postal card. The head of Adams will continue in use on the smaller cards used by ladies, the likeness of Grant on the double, or reply, postal, and the head of Liberty on the international postals. Under the head of the late President will appear the word "McKinley" and the date of his birth and death.

**Sharp Reply to Mason.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—During a call today from Senators Cullom and Mason, of Illinois, President Roosevelt had occasion to make some pointed remarks about the Canal Treaty with Great Britain, which will be sent to the Senate for ratification. Senator Mason while he talked with the President said:

"I am opposed to any treaty on the subject of the canal and will oppose it. The United States should ignore the Clayton-Bulwer Treaty and after abrogating it go ahead and construct the canal without any reference to any other nation."

Quick as a flash, it is said, the President took issue with Senator Mason. He said that any man who was opposed to the canal treaty which the Administration would send to the Senate would have to go far to explain his conduct to his constituents. After the treaty was read the man who opposed it would, in the President's opinion, have to recede or assume the position that he was not only an enemy of the canal and of the United States, but also was a friend of Great Britain to the exclusion of his country.
