RALEIGH, Oct. 10 .- The finishing ouches are now being given the speci mens of North Carolina woods to be sent to the Charleston Exposition. There are about 150 specimens. The treatment of many of these is novel and artistic and gives new ideas of the possibilities.

Work has begun on the new industrial building at the Oxford Orphan Asylum. One of the trustees says industrial work is to be made an even greater feature of the life there.

Robinson's circus was here today and the usual throngs of people from the country came in. The short crops and bad year were put out of mind for one day at least.

The penitentiary authorities intend to put every available convict on railway construction, as soon as the crops can be harvested.
