### THE STATE CAPITOL.

Pupils at Blind Asylum. Painting For State Library. Aspirants For Judgeships.

RALEIGH, November 14.—Rev. Nathaniel Harding who ever since the office of county superintendent was created had filled it in Beaufort has resigned and Stephen O. Bragaw is appointed to succeed him.

There are now 805 pupils in the institution for the blind here. Three years ago there were 230. That was the largest enrollment on record. The new building will be occupied as soon as flooring can be obtained.

The lumber business is more active than in two years past. Many long idle mills are now in full operation.

John H. Boner, the poet, who is now here, has arranged for the publication of all his poems in one volume. He has also arranged to have a painting of the late Thos. H. Hill, also a poet of ability, made and placed in the State Library here. It will be a valued addition to a fine and growing collection.

H. C. Jones and Platt D. Walker, who are here, are aspirants for places on the Supreme Court bench, but neither will enter in the way of the other. It is Col. Jones desire to be a candidate for chief justice; Walker's to be one for an associate justiceship.

### Great Railroad Combine.

New York, Nov. 13.—The final stage of the greatest railroad deal in history was entered upon today by the incorporation at Trenton, N. J., of the Northern Securities Company, with a capitalization of \$400,000,000. This company is formed as the result of negotiations which have been carried on for more than a year looking toward the joint operation and control of all the great transcontinental railroad systems.

Twenty kinds of finance banded together to push through the deal, among whom are J. Pierpont Morgan, James J. Hill, John D. Rockefeller, Jacob H. Schiff, head of the house of Kuhn, Loeb & Co.; William K. Vanderbilt, James Henry Smith, Norman B. Reed, George J. Gould, Philip D. Armour and E. H. Harriman.

The significance of this action is shown by the fact that it brings into alliance three of the greatest financial groups in the country. These are the Hill-Morgan group, the Vanderbilts and the Gould-Harriman-Kuhn, Loeb & Co. combination.

The entire plan has been a tremendous undertaking, but it has been brought to a harmonious end. "Harmony of interest" has been extended from the Atlantic to the Pacific and an armed truce has been converted into what seems a lasting peace.

### United Confederate Daughters.

WILMINGTON, N. C., Nov. 13.—The eighth annual convention United Daughters of the Confederacy, Mrs. Edwin Gardner Wood, of Jacksonville, Fla., presiding, convened today. About 176 officers and delegates are in attendance, representing every Southern State and several from the North. The morning session was principally of a social nature. Welcome addresses were made in behalf of the local chapter by Mrs. W. M. Parsley, the president, in behalf of the city by Mayor A. M. Waddell, and for the State by Gov. Charles B. Aycock.

During the progress of the session Mrs. Stonewall Jackson was present and was received with wild applause. Mrs. Cornelia B. Stone, of Galveston, presented, in behalf of Mrs. M. B. MacGill Rosenberg, of Texas, a handsome silk flag as it was first adopted by the Confederacy. The staff is surmounted by a Maltese cross, an emblem of Maryland, the native State of Dr. Charles MacGill and Mrs. Ragan MacGill, for whom the flag is designed as a memorial.

### THE GREAT GALE.

Damage to Shipping and Loss of Life in England and Denmark Reported.

LONDON, November 13.—The gale which has been sweeping over Great Britain and Ireland for the past two days continues unabated at many coast points.

Over the west lowlands the torrential rains are increasing, causing disastrous floods. Reports of wrecks and casualties continue to flow in. The death list, made up of three and four has an aggregate approaching one hundred.

The revenue cutter Active has been wrecked in the Firth and Fourth. Twenty-three of her crew were drowned and three were saved. The British steamer Stylio has been beached at Dover. She is high and dry across the parade.

Early today a French bark struck off Hendon. Nineteen of the crew were drowned.

Numerous other wrecks have been reported, but the weather, in most cases, prevents the identification of the craft. Two vessels in distress were sighted last evening off Dunqueness, but the weather was so severe that the lifeboat was unable to put out to their assistance. This morning one of them sank. The other, a steamer, reached West Bay, where a tug is now standing by her.

Copenhagen, Nov. 13.—A terrible gale and snowstorm, lasting for the past twelve hours, has done great damage throughout Denmark. There are five feet of snow here. Eight vessels are reported drifting ashore. Two have been wrecked and many lives have been lost.

### Cavalry Rout Filipinos.

MANILA, 2 November 13.—Captain Hartman's troop of the First Cavalry early this morning surprised 400 Filipinos at Bussu, in Batangas province, Southwestern Luzon.

Half the natives were armed with rifles. They were prepared for an attack and were in line pits. The cavalry attacked them on the flank, killing 16, wounding five and capturing nine rifles. The natives broke and ran, the cavalry pursuing them.

Two large hostiles of arms are reported to have been landed on the southern part of the Batangas peninsula and taken to Duragan. Major West, stationed in that locality, is trying to find these arms.
