### BEST THERE.

The North Carolina Exhibit Reported the Best at Charleston.

Secretary Bruner Leaves. Electric Line From Wilmington to Wrightsville. The Kinston Railroad. The College Grounds to be Improved.

RALPHIGH, January 9.—Donald MacRae of Wilmington, who is here, says the electric railway from Wilmington to the coast at Wrightsville will be completed in time for the summer trade. Work is now in progress.

During the past year the State library acquired 1,069 books. Of these 85 were about North Carolina or by North Carolinians.

The 19th volume of the State Records has appeared. There will be one more volume and then the general index.

The 94 volume of the North Carolina Regimental Histories was delivered to the State Librarian today.

The chief clerk to the State superintendent of public instruction says the latter today began the seventh week of his attack of pneumonia. He says the superintendent's cough is bad, his temperature rises nightly and his left lung has not healed.

Secretary Bruner of the agricultural department left today for the Charleston Exposition. He says the exhibit of the department there is completed. It is so admirably laid out that what yet remains to be done is simply changes to improve the effect.

President Hugh G. Chatham of the North Carolina railway has just returned from Charleston. He says that the North Carolina exhibit is the best there and the only complete one. Quite a number of North Carolina cotton mills are represented in the 'cotton palace', many are not.

The railway which is to be built from Kinston southward, is to strike the Atlantic Coast Line at Warsaw. The road will be 56 miles long. The Kinston people will build it to Hallsville, and the Wilmington lumber interest will build from Wallace to Hallsville.

The grounds of the State Normal and Industrial College at Greensboro, now very bare, are to be beautified. George Foster Peabody gave to the College for a park \$10,000 and of this \$5000 is to be at once expended. In the spring there will be some notable visitors to the college, among them, President Elliott of Harvard.

The Norwood Cigar company of this city has the largest factory in the State. It today declared an 8 per cent dividend.

### Affairs of Germany.

BERLIN, Jan. 8.—The speech from the throne, read by the imperial chancery, Count von Buelow, at the opening of the Prussian Diet today, took a gloomy view of the economic situation. It pointed out that the revenue of the State railroads in 1901 fell considerably short of the estimates, and that the whole results of the financial year were disappointing.

In the budget for 1902 the revenue is estimated below that of the current year but the balance between revenue and the expenditure is to be maintained without having recourse to a loan.

### DECLARE A DIVIDEND.

Meeting of the Directors of the North Carolina Road.

RALPHIGH, Jan. 9.—The Directors of the North Carolina railway of which the State is owner, met in the Governor's office today and declared a 5 per cent dividend. It is the largest ever declared heretofore, it has been a 6 1/2 per cent road. It is leased to the Southern Railway for 99 years.

### Ten Men in Flooded Mine.

Negaunee, Mich., Jan. 8.—Officials of the Negaunee mine now say that 10 men, and possibly 12 are still under ground.

General Manager T. F. Cole, of the United States Steel Corporation, arrived in the city by special train today and he is now at the mine assisting other officials in planning to recover the bodies.

Men were at work all night putting in additional pumps to reduce the water in the drift where the men are entombed and if possible prevent the mine from flooding. The additional pumps are working, and the water is under control. Mine bosses say it may take a week to recover all the bodies.

### New Gas Well on Fire.

Pont Huron, Mich., Jan. 8.—Gas was struck this afternoon in a well which was being bored for salt at the Cleveland and Sarala Sawmill Company's plant in Sarala, Ont., just across the St. Clair river.

It was immediately ignited by a stove in a building adjoining the well and the company's plant and surrounding buildings are now in great danger from the flames. The machinery in the well, which was destroyed, was worth \$40,000.

The gas is coming from the solid rock and may burn several weeks. The flames are shooting up 50 feet into the air. Firemen are throwing water on the mill property and adjoining buildings, which will be destroyed if the wind changes.

### JANUARY PROCEEDINGS.

#### Of the Board of Commissioners of Craven County. Financial Showing.

The Board met at the Court House in New Bern on the 6th day of January 1902 in regular monthly session.

Present Commissioners Jones, Wadsworth and Wood.

Ordered that item of solvent credits being \$1000 in 8th township listed to R. A. Richardson be stricken from the list and the sheriff is ordered to reimburse said Richardson to the amount of the said solvent credits he having paid his taxes including said solvent credits.

Ordered that the solvent credits listed by J. H. Lokey of \$2000 be and is hereby stricken from the list as it appears to the Board that the said solvent credits had already been listed in the mill property owned by Lokey and Cannon and said \$2000 was double taxation.

Ordered by the Board that Saml. Dudley be relieved from poll tax on account of infirmity.

Ordered by the Board that the chairman be and is hereby empowered to employ assistance clerical and otherwise on such terms as he deems advisable to collect the unlisted property and poll taxes of the county.

Ordered that O. H. Wetherington be instructed to furnish rations to Abe Foy and wife to the amount of \$2.00 per month on account of infirmity and old age until further orders.

Ordered that property listed to Barbara Dove in No. 5 township be reduced from \$310 to 120 on account of error.

Ordered that the report of the assessors on the Congdon mill property be accepted and spread upon the minutes and said property be reduced from \$20,000 to \$17,000 in pursuance of said report.

Board took recess until 3 o'clock.

Board met at 3 o'clock pursuant to recess.

Present Commissioners Jones, Fulcher, Wadsworth and Wood.

Ordered that property to E. W. Smallwood in No. 7 township be reduced from \$1500 to \$800 on account of error of list taker.

Ordered that item of solvent credits listed to J. J. Ballard in No. 6 township be stricken from the list as land upon which mortgage was held is given for taxation for year 1901.

Ordered that on payment of the proper tax to the sheriff license be granted to H. W. Jewell to retail liquor at 39 1/2 Middle street.

Ordered that item under head of watches and jewelry listed to W. H. Coward be reduced from \$50 to \$2.00 on account of error.

Ordered that property in No. 5 township being 200 acres valued at \$200 listed to R. L. Wayne be stricken from the list the same having been given in by J. A. Morton.

Ordered by the Board that the Henry Garris land near Vanceboro be listed for the years 1895, 96, 98, 99, 1900 and 1901 under head of property listed in office and double tax be charged on same for each of the foregoing years.

Ordered by the Board that Archbell & Co. having made the lowest bid for furnishing the county poor for the year 1902 that the said contract be and is hereby awarded to Archbell & Co. for the year 1902 at 12 1/2 per ration in accordance with bid submitted by him.

Ordered that Mr. Penn Willis be instructed to furnish McLarbond and wife with rations to the amount of \$2.00 per month until further orders.

The Board proceeded to draw a jury to serve at a civil term of the Superior Court to be held on the third Monday before the first Monday in March it being the 10th day of February 1902.

Ward be and is hereby instructed to request the Governor to call a special term of the Superior Court of Craven county for one week beginning February 3rd 1902 for the trial of civil cases only, because of the crowded condition of the docket, on account of the inability of the presiding Judge to try the cases during the fall term 1901.

Ordered that the item of all other property being 287 dollars listed to L. H. Cannon in 8th township be stricken from the list and he be relieved of tax on same.

Ordered that the James City property belonging to Blades Lumber Co. be reduced from \$25,000 valuation to \$17,000 on account of error of list taker.

The auditing committee submitted their report which was accepted and ordered spread upon the minutes.
