MASONIC.

The Grand Lodge in Annual Communion in Raleigh.

National Guard Delegates. Oats Are Killed. Free Libraries. New Dormitory Opening Feb. 4. After The Swindlers.

RALPH, N. C., Jan. 14.—The Grand Lodge of Masons met in annual communion this evening. Grand Master Beverly S. Royster presiding. In his report he urges the employment of two lecturers, at a fixed salary, to visit lodges as the Grand Master or the Grand Secretary may direct, the lodges thus visited to furnish the lecturers with board and lodging. The Grand Master also urges the codification of the laws and decisions of the Grand Lodge. The report of Grand Secretary John C. Drewry was also submitted, showing the membership of the order in this State to be 12,012, a gain of 400 over last year.

A special order was issued for military headquarters here to day, appointing Adjutant General Royster and Colonels Mason, Armfield, Rodman, Perry, Pearson and Williams delegates to the annual meeting of the National Guard Association at Washington January 20-23. Sheriff Page of this county, a veteran farmer, tells me he has never seen fall sown oats so completely winter-killed as they now are in this section. He says the dry autumn was largely the cause. In entire fields sown as early as September none are now to be seen. Fall sown wheat is also badly killed.

Some interest was expressed here at the news to day that ex-Governor Russell is a candidate for the U. S. District Attorneyship.

This county at last has free public school libraries. Six were authorized to day, also three for Franklin county, making the total number for the State 260.

Spencer B. Adams, who was the Republican nominee for Governor is in a hospital at Salisbury, where yesterday a difficult and dangerous surgical operation was very successfully performed upon him. Revenue collector Duncan who went there to see him, says he is out of danger.

State Auditor B. F. Dixon, chairman of the Soldiers' Home board, says it is decided to have the formal opening of the new dormitory February 4. He today called a meeting of the board on that day, and sent invitations to the various chapters of Daughters of the Confederacy to send representatives to the ceremony. The board of lady managers is also invited to be present. There will be speeches by Gov. Aycock, Auditor Dixon and others; the State flag will be raised on the flag staff, a band will furnish music and there will be a reception and other incidents. The local Confederate Veterans, and perhaps a number from other points, will attend.

Acting attorney-general Brown Shepherd is receiving many claims against that great swindle, the Amos Owen Cherry Tree Company of Rutherford county, these coming mainly from poor factory girls. He will put the claims in the hands of a lawyer. The swindlers have employed all the lawyers in Rutherford county save one, it is said. Their case comes up tomorrow before a United States commissioner, on a charge of using the mails for a swindling scheme.

The State Agricultural Society's executive committee meet here at noon to day, upon special call, to elect a president, to succeed L. Banks Holt, who declined the office, and to wind up the business of the last fair.

A Wonderful Daisy.

A daisy has been produced in California that is a floral wonder. The new daisy is very large, easily grown and an extremely free bloomer. It has been named the Shasta daisy, and the grower who originated it, Luther Burbank, says that it was obtained by crossing the common American field daisy with the Japanese and European kinds. The flowers when cut remain perfectly fresh and in good condition for two weeks or more. It is likely to become very popular for decorative purposes.—Boston Transcript.

Clerk and Carrier Examination at New Bern, N. C.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on February 19, 1902, an examination will be held in this city for the positions of clerk and carrier in the Post-Office Service.

All persons who have been examined for the position of clerk or carrier within the past year and failed to pass may be re-examined upon filing new applications in due time.

This examination affords an excellent opportunity for entering the Federal service to bright, energetic young persons who are not afraid of hard work, and the Commission hopes that a sufficient number of intelligent, active persons will present themselves for this examination. It may be stated that there is a wider field for advancement upon merit in the Federal service than in many private employments, not only by promotion in the same office, but by transfer to other parts of the service.

The nature of the examination is a test of practical, general intelligence, and of adaptability in post-office work. The age limitations for this examination are as follows:

All positions, 18 to 45 years. All applicants, male and female, must have the medical certificate in Form 101 executed. Applicants for male clerk and for carrier must be at least 5 feet 4 inches in height, and weigh not less than 125 pounds.

The names of all eligibles will be entered on both the clerk and the carrier registers, and appointment from either register will remove the eligible's name from both registers.

This examination is open to all citizens of the United States who comply with the requirements. Competitors will be rated without regard to any consideration other than the qualifications shown in their examination papers, and eligibles will be certified strictly in accordance with the civil service law and rules.

For application blank (Form 101), full instructions, specimen examination questions, and information relative to the duties and salaries of the different positions, application should be made to the undersigned.

Applications must be on file with the secretary of the local board before the hour of closing business on February 5, 1902.
