RAILROAD WRECK.

Rear End Collision of Freight Trains On Seaboard.

Raleigh Takes a Brace on Auditorium Matter, South Dakota Case Crowds For Good Roads Convention.

RALEIGH, February 11.—A rear end collision of freight trains on the Seaboard Air Line occurred near Forestville, 16 miles north of here early this morning. The engine of the front train was cut to pieces and set on fire and two negro employees in it were burned to death. The track was blocked for ten hours.

It is decided by the stockholders of the auditorium company to go ahead and build. The plan is for a structure of 100 feet front and 84 feet depth, to seat 8000 persons; to be one story in height and of brick and galvanized iron. A site will cost \$4,000 and the building \$7,200. These are the estimates. There is \$6,000 in hand and \$3,000 more pledged. The building is to be used solely for an auditorium and not as a theatre. It is ordered that a site be bought by March 1.

Attorneys are here quite frequently looking after the State's interest in the suit against it by South Dakota, to force it to pay face value and all interest in Western North Carolina Railway bonds. This State will present a powerfully strong case. It goes before the United States Supreme Court March 1.

Strange to say there was only one call yesterday for State funds for the public schools. This was made yesterday by Guilford county, and was for a small sum. Today it was withdrawn.

Crowds assembled today to see the "Good Roads" train's working force prepare a street for macadam. The ground was so hard that the 8 horse plow made no impression and in fact failed utterly. Then a 4 horse plow was put at work and a lot of men with picks. The local road authorities would have used a two horse plow, and done the work rapidly. There is all kinds of machinery in use and on exhibition.

BLOW AT TRUSTS.

Measures Suggested to Prevent Over-Capitalization, Stock Watering Discrimination in Prices.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Legislation that will remedy the Trust evil is urgently recommended in the second portion of the report of the Industrial Commission, which is made public. It covers the report on industries, and in this connection repeats its recommendation to Congress in 1899, with supplementary recommendations. In 1899 the report said:

That the promoters and organizers of corporations or individual commissions which look to the public to purchase or deal in their stocks or securities should be required to furnish full details regarding organization.

The Commission now recommends: That District Attorneys of the United States be authorized and directed to make prosecutions for violations of the Federal anti-Trust laws.

That combinations and conspiracies, in the form of Trusts or otherwise in restraint of trade or production, which, by the consensus of judicial opinion, are unlawful, should be so declared by legislation uniform in all jurisdictions, and as to all persons, and such statutes should be thoroughly enforced.

That stringent laws be enacted by the Congress and the several State Legislatures, making both penal and criminal the vicious practice of discriminating between customers and cutting rates or prices in one local below those which prevail generally, for the purpose of destroying local competition; and that such laws should give to any person damaged the right to sue for and recover prescribed penalties and make it the duty of prosecuting officers to proceed against the offenders.

That to prevent over-capitalization the several State Legislatures enact laws similar to the anti-stock-watering laws of Massachusetts; also to provide for state supervision of all public service corporations, with power to recommend or regulate rates for service, and to pass upon the public need, desirability or exigency of any proposed new services.

That an annual franchise tax be imposed upon all State corporations engaged in interstate commerce, calculated upon the gross earnings of each corporation from its interstate business; that the minimum rate of such tax be low, but that the rate be gradually increased with increases in earnings; that there be created in the trade a permanent bureau, the duties of which shall be to register all State corporations engaged in interstate or foreign commerce; to secure from such corporations all reports needed to enable the Government to levy a franchise tax with certainty and justice, and to collect the same, to such corporations as will guarantee the completeness and accuracy of the information needed to ascertain whether such corporations are observing the conditions prescribed in the act, and to enforce penalties against delinquents, and to publish information regarding such combinations and the industries in which they may be engaged, so as to furnish to the Congress proper information for possible future legislation.
