RALEIGH.

Governor Goes to Greensboro. Industrial Building For Oxford Orphanage. Many Districts Without School Houses.

RALEIGH, April 4.—Governor Aycock left this morning for Greensboro, to attend the educational conference there in which 20 counties participated. The Governor spoke this evening, as did also State Superintendent Joyner.

Secretary of State Grimes returned today from Grimsland, where he attended the marriage of his sister, Miss Theodora Grimes, to Mr. Wiley Rodman of Washington, N. C.

The executive committee of the trustees of the Oxford Orphan asylum is called to meet there the middle of this month to provide for an industrial building. The latter will be spacious and well equipped and will be in the grounds of the asylum. A small building now used for this purpose is without the grounds.

Grand Secretary Woodell of the Odd Fellows went to Lexington last night and formed a lodge of that order. The Odd Fellows have collected some money for the home for aged members and widows of members, which it is their place to establish.

Interest in the State fair was never greater, and it has become the largest of all the fairs held in the south. Letters are even now pouring in about it. Its great popularity makes it a reason-line for North Carolinians. Gentlemen from Richmond and Norfolk who attended it last October expressed their admiration and their surprise. This was particularly the case with Col. John W. Gordon of Richmond and Judge Garnett of Norfolk. It is proposed to make the fair this year even greater than before and if a sufficiency of cars is provided by the railroads it is said the attendance will be 50 per cent larger.

The postmaster here, who pays all the rural free delivery mail carriers in the State has paid 74 for March. This is the present number. He is advised that by June 1 there will be 86 more.

The fact that there are 900 school districts in this State which have no school houses will cause a sensation in educational circles. Of these 904 are white districts. There are 950 log school houses and of these 897 are occupied by whites. The day of the log school houses is evidently far from gone in North Carolina.

Early Escapes Lynching, and Shooting Does Not Hurt Him.

RALEIGH, April 4.—Thomas Early the negro who so narrowly escaped lynching at Edenton, and death on the train while being taken to Norfolk, Va., was brought here this afternoon at five o'clock, and was immediately taken to the penitentiary.

Early was able to walk, and did not appear to suffer much from the bullet wound in the neck.
He does not seem to be over 32 years, and is repulsive in appearance. He had very little to say on his way here.

Funds for Fortifications.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—The House Committee on Appropriations today reported the Fortifications Appropriation bill. It appropriates \$6,563,455, which is \$801,566 less than the last act.

With the appropriations in the bill \$68,365,550 of the \$69,820,233 included in the Endicott board scheme of sea coast defenses will have been appropriated.

The more important items in the bill are for gun and mortar batteries, \$2,000,000, and for armament and fortifications, \$2,512,750; for the board of ordnance and fortifications, \$1,000,000.

BLAZE AT ATLANTIC CITY.

Beach Front Swept For Two Blocks. Loss May Exceed \$750,000.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 3.—Twelve hotels and more than a score of small buildings adjoining the board walk which is built along the ocean edge, were destroyed to-day by a fire which swept the beach front for two long blocks from Illinois avenue to New York avenue. The loss, it is said, will exceed \$750,000. In this respect the conflagration is most disastrous that has ever visited this city. The loss will be only partly covered by insurance, as the rate of 5 per cent charged by insurance companies on property here is regarded as almost prohibitive. Fortunately no lives were sacrificed, though probably a dozen persons were slightly injured and burned during the fire. It was reported early in the afternoon that six men had perished in the flames, but the rumor was without foundation. The origin of the fire is unknown, but is said to have started in either Brady's bath or the Tarleton Hotel, which adjoins the bath at Illinois avenue and the board walk.

American Coal for Swiss.

LONDON, April 3.—The Daily Mail today records the arrival at Southampton of a large party of American ship-owners, imported by an English firm for the purpose of "showing the Scotch workmen how to do it." The labor-saving pneumatic riveter with which the Americans are equipped creates uneasiness in the minds of the British unionist workmen.

Another London paper reprints from a Swiss review details of a plan by which American coal is supplanting the German article in Switzerland. According to this authority large warehouses will be built at northern French ports for the purpose of storing and sorting American coal, and also for the purpose of manufacturing "briquets" (compressed coal bricks) from the waste of French and Swiss railroads.

More Money For Cotton Operatives.

Worcester, Mass., April 3.—As a result of an agreement between owners of six cotton mills along the valley of the Blackstone river nearly 2,300 operatives will be given an increase of about 10 per cent in wages, beginning next Monday. The increase is voluntary on the part of the mill owners.

A Victory For Labor.

WASHINGTON, April 3.—The House Committee on Labor today ordered a favorable report on the eight-hour bill, so-called, providing that in every contract for work for the Government it shall be specified that the work is to be done on an eight-hour basis.

This measure has been strongly supported by labor organizations and opposed by the large armor, shipbuilding, ordnance and other concerns having contracts with the Government. The favorable report was ordered without division.

Negro Labor the Best.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., April 3.—The modern strike in this city today involves about 1,200 men, the members of the Home-Masters union, the Galt from Waco, the Chattanooga Ore and Furnace Company, Price & Ryan and the Chattanooga Coal Pits. Waco striking to go to work today. The present issue is the employment of negro labor.
