## RALEIGH.

Company Chartered. Insurance Sult. Republican Convention. State Turnpike.

RALEIGH, N. C., April 12.—The State chartered today the McKimmon Development company of Maxton with \$50,000 capital authorized. The company is authorized to deal in all kinds of real, personal and general property, and has for a special purpose the assisting of those who desire to grow fruits, vegetables and truck for the market by advancing money to the planters; the incorporation are A. J. McKimmon, J. and G. Lippman, R. M. Williams and H. F. Murray.

Ex-Governor Jarvis, Donnell Gilliam of Tarboro and W. H. White of Norfolk are here arguing before Judge Purnell in the United States Circuit Court the suit of Thomas and Mersey Insurance Co. vs. the Old Dominion Steamship Company in which it is sought to recover the loss occasioned by the burning of 180 bales of cotton on an old flat in Tar River in 1897. The insurance companies paid the insurance to the owners of the cotton and seek to recover from the steamship company, on the ground of negligence in handling the cotton. White and Gilliam represent the Old Dominion Company, and Jarvis and James H. Pou for the insurance companies.

Judge Purnell has continued until May 14th the hearing of Recorders of the Board of Commerce, of Buffalo vs. C. G. Bulling et al involving \$6,400 acres of land in Tyrrell County. The contention is that the defendant procured deed to the land by conspiracy in that they induced the tax collector to make sale for taxes so that they might make the purchase.

Chairman J. C. Pritchard (U. S. Senator) and Secretary D. C. Pearson, of the State Republican Executive Convention here issued the official call for the State Convention to be held at Greensboro Thursday August 21st said convention states will nominate candidates for chief justice two associate justices of the Supreme court, ten Superior court Judges, one railroad commissioner and superintendent of public instruction.

Wake county is preparing to abandon the practice of using tents for the convicts worked on the public roads and will construct permanent quarters at convenient intervals in the road district. There are on average of about 135 convicts on the roads, and there is a constant improvement in the condition of the highways.

A fine turnpike road is to be constructed with convict labor from J. Pearson in Ash county to North Wilkesboro in Wilkes county.

Ashe, Alleghany and Watauga counties form an extreme North Western limit of North Carolina and are because of the mountains badly cut off from the rest of the State, while access to points in Virginia is comparatively easy. The proposed turnpike will put them in touch with the railroads leading into various parts of the State and really recedes them for North Carolina. The turnpike will be 90 miles in length.
