SOUTHERN MAN IN THE CABINET

North Carolinians Have Been Suggested.

Washington, D. C., April 16—A strong combination is pushing for a Cabinet place a Southern man in the present Administration. The matter was laid before the President by Senator Pritchard and Representatives Blackburn and Moody, of North Carolina. They had a talk of some length on the subject, pointing out to the President the fact that one-third of the country in point of population is ignored in the cabinet representation.

Among the names considered in this connection have been H. Clay Evans, the Pension Commissioner; Senator McLaurin, of South Carolina; Captain Char-

les Price, of Salisbury, N. C.; division counsel of the Southern Railway, or Judge Bynum, of Greensboro, N. C.; ex-Governor W. O. Bradey, of Kentucky, and even Senator Pritchard himself has been spoken of, but he will not consider the proposition.

RALEIGH.

Imperial Tobacco Co. To Fight Tobacco Trust.

Delegates to Confederate Reunion. Weather Checks Farm Work. Base Ball Interest. State Charters. Fruit and Berry Outlook Good.

RALEIGH, April 18.—The Imperial Tobacco Company is going to fight the Tobacco trust, and today paid \$1,000 license tax to do business in this city and county.

Considerable interest is shown here in the project to build a railway from Raleigh to Washington, N. C. It is asserted that by the end of next week Raleigh will have subscribed the \$50,000 expected of it. As planned, the road will be nearly an air line.

Seventeen persons will go from here to the Confederate reunion at Dallas. A number of people here leave today on their way to that place.

Yesterday's rain will check farm work for several days. Low lands are but little looked after as yet, as most of them have been water soaked for months.

Plans are not perfected for the completion of the Church of the Good Shepherd here, which it is proposed to make the cathedral of this Protestant Episcopal diocese. Two plans are proposed; one to let a contract to build the church and put on the roof, but not put up the interior; the other to complete all. The foundation has been laid three years.

Many out of town people are coming here to see the game of base ball tomorrow afternoon between the University of Virginia and the University of North Carolina. Raleigh will send out a large audience.

All the players on Raleigh's league team will arrive here Monday evening, from Washington.

The State charters the Clin-Cho Company, of Goldsboro, with a capital of \$125,000. It is to manufacture a beverage to be dispensed in drug stores, etc. M. E. Robinson and others are the stockholders.

A charter is also granted the Melville Brick Company of Mebane, capital \$10,000. K. W. Thompson and others stockholders.

The State Superintendent of public instruction rules that the apportionment for the public schools is made in January and July, based on the census returns made September of the previous year.

The fourth volume of the North Carolina Regimental Histories will be out in a fortnight.

Governor Aycock is greatly pleased at the interest taken in public education. He spoke at La Grange last night. The public schools there are kept open 6 months in the year. He says the people will take steps to keep them open 9 months.

The outlook for fruit and grapes and berries appears to be very good. How many of these escaped the later frosts and freezes is really puzzling. The grape crop promises to be a very large. Southern Pines is now the centre of that industry.

Boers Practically Agreed for Peace.

London, April 17.—The Daily Mail claims to have authority to announce that basis of peace have been practically agreed upon at Pretoria, but says that some little time will elapse before the details of the plan can be perfected.

The papers adds that upon finding that the British government refused on Wednesday to modify its terms with regards to amnesty, banishment and a responsible government, the Boer delegates met again on Thursday.

The British decision, practically leaving them the alternative of accepting the British terms or breaking up the conference, was then communicated to them and the delegates proved much more reasonable.

When Lord Milner, the British high commissioner in South Africa, promised the delegates one or two seats on the executive council subject to the approval of the government and pending the restoration of a responsible government, they practically agreed to accept the British terms.

Some details, continues the Daily Mail, which are not likely to create difficulty, still remain.
