### HINTS FOR FARMERS

ers, we must first become acquantied with the soil and be particular as to the hind and quality of seed yet intend to sow, says P. J. McGlynn in Profits Farmer. A large minher of farmers spend much of their time and money buying and planting poor seed. Many plant poor seed because they are cheap, but which aftitimes prove most expensive. Experience has faught me that the better the seed the better the crop. Great care should be given to the soil as well as to the seed. One variety, a seed might do extremely well in a soil, while another of a different nature would be a complete failure under similar conditions. The cultivation of a crop is only of secondary importance in comparison to either soil or seed. Therefore it should be obvious to avery, one that these two particular; points one that these two particular points are of paramount importance and are worthy of much thought from those in-terested in agricultural pursuits. It is essential that ever farmer be thoroughly acquainted with the soil, for upon this knowledge his success largely, depends, and I can truthfully say that if this particular point is carefully considered a crop could be easily expected. -that is, if the season be a favorable one-and not regarded as merely a mat-

Approaching the Limit.

It is often assumed that the possibilities of the expandoppolities absorption dustry on the ranges are almost bendeless. This is not true. The limit has almost been reached without being us interference with other industries. And sheep are not going to supplant cattle and horses to a very large extent, so long as prices for the latter are so favorable to the producer. Another feature of the business is worth noting. ture of the business is sworth noting, and that is the exhaustion of range pastures. The range will not support vastly increased berds or flocks. The land is pretty well occupied now; in some localities it is overstocked, and in others range grasses have so deteriorated under hard usage that they will not keep many animals. It seems that the limit of range sheep production is being approached. The sheep industry will settle down, and finally, we trust, after a few years. It has been disturbed so frequently by new developments that people expect an upheaval every decade, but a more constant production is likely to prevail pefore long.-National Stockman and
