**THOMAS' GOOD WORK.**

Continued. Rural Free Mail Delivery. Inspection. Fish to Stock Rivers. Special to Journal.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 7.—Congressman Charles R. Thomas has secured Rural Free Mail Delivery routes and the Government Inspector will in the first week in June, examine Jones and Craven counties and other routes in the Third Congressional District.

The United States Fish Commissioner advises that 750,000 shad have been furnished for the Neuse and Trent rivers, also that larger supplies of shad will be sent for these and other rivers of the district.

A few days ago Michael Davitt celebrated his fifty-sixth birthday. His career has been remarkable when it is remembered that he began work as a child of ten in a Lancashire cotton mill eleven. While he was in Australia in 1860 he was returned to parliament without opposition for East Kerry and South Mayo. He resigned from the house three years ago.

**The Shad Fisheries.**

According to recent data secured by the United States fish commission, there are about 25,000 men employed in the shad fisheries of the Atlantic seaboard of the United States. The value of the boats, apparatus of capture, etc., exceeds \$2,000,000, and the annual catch approximately 15,000,000 in number, valued at \$3,000,000.

**RALEIGH.**

Report of Penitentiary Directors Ready.

Important Case for Federal Court. Marriage. Charter Granted New Bern Incorporators. Additional Delegates to Charleston Exposition.

RALEIGH, May 7.—The penitentiary directors adjourned today and completed their annual report. This will be given to Gov. Aycock upon his return here next Wednesday or Thursday. Good progress is being made at the penitentiary farm. The lands subject to overflow having been abandoned, there is no longer any chance of food damage. Nearly 500 convicts are building railroads. This is profitable employment. The total number of convicts today was 302. Of these only 128 are in the penitentiary proper. Of the 174 less than 64 are females. The latter are all employed in the garden, the laundry and the sewing rooms. No other work is going on in the prison; as practically no able bodied male convicts are there.

At the approaching term of the Federal Court here there is a case of some interest. This is a case against F. B. Arundel, who was general manager of the penitentiary, for "escape," that is in permitting the escape of a Federal convict. The latter was a "trustee" and was sent out to bring in some cows. He never came back.

Good rains fell here last evening, but the drought is beginning to make itself unpleasantly felt in many sections. At the Church of the Good Shepherd this morning Mr. William Smith, son of Mr. W. W. Smith and grandson of the late Chief Justice W. N. H. Smith, was married to Miss Nell Liston, of this city formerly of Charlotte.

The "Nine O'clock Cotton Club" gave its first dance this evening at the assembly room in the Ramey Memorial library Mr. John H. Andrews led.

Insurance commissioner and Mrs. Jones Richard Young arrived this morning having ended their bridal tour.

Prof. Carlyle of Wake Forest college says an organization of students there to press the work of improving rural public schools has been affected and that 60 counties are already represented. He says Gov. Aycock will soon address this association.

State Auditor Dixon today sent out the blanks on which the holdings of bank stock are to be sworn to.

A charter was granted today to the North Carolina Industrial College Company, New Bern; one to the Clayton Mower Mfg. Co., of Clayton, capital \$50,000, and one to the Williamston Milling and Ginning Co.

Commissioner of Agriculture Patterson says: "I find there will be very little, if any, difference between sales of fertilizers last spring and this spring. There is a decrease of cotton fertilizers, made up however by sales of tobacco fertilizers."

Wednesday and Saturday at the Battery Park hotel, Asheville, the alumni of Wake Forest college will have a banquet. Among the speakers will be E. M. Fostat of Philadelphia, Rev. Thomas Dixon of Va., J. L. White, of Macon, Ga., Rev. C. S. Farris of Stetson University, Florida.

Gov. Aycock appointments an additional delegates from this State to the Charleston Exposition on "German Day" C. B. Tanner of Carolina; W. E. Eryin of Durham; L. H. Outler of New Bern. A commission is issued to Baxter R. Hunter of Shelby as assistant surgeon general of the State Guard with the rank of Major.
