### NORFOLK.

Trouble in Store for Traction People. Damaging Fire. Fine New Club House. Large Business for a Norfolk Firm.

May 8.—Appearance indicates that there is more trouble in store for our Street railway Company and its employees. The new men are attempting to organize a branch of the Union and the company have opinions of their own regarding the utility of such associations when applied to the working of street railways. The company is evidently determined that no union shall exist amongst their motormen and conductors. There has been about twenty men dismissed from the service during the past week, some for stealing, some for drunkenness and others for advocating the strike of the union. The managers of the road seem to have got the knocking down system well in hand and are determined to end this disgraceful business that has been carried on so long and so openly.

Norfolk was again visited with a large fire on Wednesday last, consuming lots of valuable property including the printing presses and the whole outfit of the Norfolk Dispatch, although it did not stop a single issue of said newspaper.

The Heinz pickling and preserving company have about completed their factory and are ready for work. They are advertising for three hundred women and girls to operate the plant. The company has contracts for hundreds of acres of fruits and vegetables to be supplied by the truckers of this vicinity. The benefit of such concerns to a city can be readily seen.

### RALEIGH.

Grand Council of Red Men in Session.

Study of Electric Power of Neuse River. Matter of Masonic Temple. Special Terms of Court Raleigh. Hostelry Works to sell to Combination.

RALEIGH, May 8.—The class in electrical engineering at the Agricultural and Mechanical college here spent the day at Millburn, on the Neuse river, 6 miles from here, examining and studying the electric power plant there which will supply power here. The class in surveying is making a survey for a railway branch 4 or 5 miles in length from Wake Forest to the Falls of Neuse, for the Seaboard Air-Line. This work will require perhaps a week.

The Grand Council of Red Men met in annual session here today, Great Sachem E. H. King of Raleigh presiding. All the councils are well represented. There were special exercises at Oconeeches hall, Joseph E. Pogue calling the assemblage to order as master of ceremonies; prayer was offered by the Great Prophet, W. L. Liddell, of Charlotte, and address of welcome made by J. W. Hinsdale, Jr., of Raleigh; a response by W. L. Liddell; an address on "The Primitive Red Man," by Claude M. Bernard of Raleigh; another on "Red-manship in North Carolina," by Hill E. King; the degree work was exemplified by T. P. Sale and C. B. Green of Durham spoke in behalf of an orphanage. Impromptu talks by members of the order followed.

At the State fair grounds at 10 o'clock tomorrow a barbecue will be given the Red Men.

It is learned that at Oxford on St. John's Day, June 24, the Grand Lodge of Masons will formally take up the matter of building a temple. It appears to be the opinion that the location will be definitely agreed on. There is no difference of opinion as to the need of a temple.

The special terms of court for Rutherford county were ordered today by the Governor; each for 2 weeks, and both for civil cases.

The stockholders of the Raleigh Hostelry Yarn Mill at a meeting decided to fully endorse the action of the directors favoring entering a combination and selling the plant to Henry E. Fries of Salem.
