### RALEIGH.

Prospects Firemen's Tournament at Capitol City.

Commencement Exercises State Charter. Prominent Man Resigns. State Holiday Observance. North Carolina at St. Louis. Prominent Arrivals.

RALEIGH, May 20.—The commencement exercises of the Baptist Female University and of Peace Institute here are in progress. At Peace, Rev. Tucker Graham preached the baccalaureate sermon. The alumnae met today and this evening the annual concert was given. The graduating exercises take place tomorrow morning. This school closes the most successful term in all its history. At the Baptist Female University Rev. R. T. Vann, the president preached the baccalaureate sermon, Rev. W. C. Tyree the missionary sermon. This morning Rev. Dr. W. E. Hatcher of Richmond delivered the annual literary address. The attendance during the term has been over 260.

President James D. McNeill of the North Carolina State Firemen's Association, was here today to meet the local firemen, with a view to having the annual convention and its attendant tournament held at Raleigh. He said he had no doubt that it would be held here.

The State charters the Broadus and Ives Lumber Company of New Bern, capital \$50,000.

William Simpson, the veteran secretary of the State Board of Pharmacy, who has for 30 years owned a drug store here has resigned. This step is due to failing health and falling eyesight.
