RALEIGH.

Very Light and Insufficient Rain Reported.

Weather Station to be Established at Asheville. Report of State Auditor Issued. Shortage in Coal Supply Becoming Serious.

RALEIGH, June 20.—Only one third of the rain needed has fallen in this part of the State. At least 2 inches more is needed.

Today Gov. Aycock received an application for the pardon of a sheep stealer. In the common phrase a sheep stealer is considered one of the meanest of criminals.

The second day session of the State Dental Society was held today, with increased attendance. This evening Dr. Vines E. Turner gave an "At Home" to the members at his residence here. Many persons prominent in society were present, to meet the dentists.

John C. Drewry, grand secretary of the Grand Lodge of Masons, will be a candidate for a Democratic nomination to the lower house of the legislature, from this county.

Commissioner of Agriculture Patterson says the crops make quite a favorable appearance, after the rains. The heads of the wheat are unusually well filled.

Asheville is after July 1 to be made a regular weather station. Dr. Gettings, now assistant observer here, goes there and takes charge. He is a valuable man.

The annual report of the State auditor is at last issued.

The weather report for May for North Carolina, issued today, says the mean temperature for the State was 68.5, which is 2.4 above normal. The highest monthly mean was 75, at Southern Pines; the lowest 60, at Linville. The highest absolute temperature was 99, at Southern Pines; the lowest 31, at Brevard. The rainfall was only 2.59 inches, which is 1.61 below normal.

The coal supply here is so short that several factories, including those making ice, are using wood. So is the electric light plant.
