An alarm was turned in from the Five Points station last night at 10:45. The fire proved to be of no consequence and was quickly put out.

WHOSE THE BLAME?

The Small Pox Condition Due to Somebody's Gross Negligence.

It has been the cause of much severe comment that two persons who on their own admission had been in a house where small pox existed should be allowed to go about our streets unmolested. It is a well known fact that about two or three weeks ago a negro woman came to this city from Adams Creek, a neighborhood in Carteret county where small pox existed. She had been in the locality of the disease and escaped to avoid vaccination. Dr. Charles Duffy received word from Dr. Clark of that place that the woman would probably be in New Bern and Dr. Duffy gave due notice to the city authorities that such a person had been in the city or was at that time. A search was made but it was of course ineffectual, the woman had disappeared but it is stated on good authority that all four cases of small pox were undoubtedly exposed by this woman. Comment on cases like this is of course superfluous and it should be. Dr. Duffy's warning was given in time and had a thorough search been made this trouble may have been avoided.

There is another cause for complaint in this matter. Last Monday a doctor was in town who was attending the case of small pox in Havelock. He was under the influence of liquor and though he may have taken precautions against infection, he should not have been allowed to travel out of his town and after he had arrived here his own talk was sufficient to put him under quarantine.

The person at Havelock was reported yesterday to be in a dying condition; that being the case, the doctor's presence in this city on Monday was extremely hazardous. The doctor was warned in the town of Newport not to mingle with the people and on his continuing to disregard their wishes was placed in the guard house there Wednesday.

The report on the cases here is such that there need be no fear of a spread of the disease on their account. Whatever develops later will be due to other causes.

The New Railroad.

For many years the project of a railroad from this city to points in Pamlico has been discussed from every standpoint.

It was argued that a railroad should be built in order to place Pamlico in the column of progress. It was claimed that the railroad would be really of service in expediting the transportation of the products of that county.

On the other hand, the building of the railroad, was charged to be a burden, from which this city and Pamlico, would never recover. It was claimed to be detrimental to the stock raising business of that county. It was argued to be unnecessary, as the water transportation facilities was sufficient to move the produce and fish of that section, but after all these many years of arguing and bickering, it transpires that the Pamlico and New Bern railroad is to become a reality.

At the recent election in Pamlico it was decided that the people of that county wanted a road, and the meeting between their business men, and our business men, determined the fact that a railroad should be built, and yesterday actual work was in progress building the road. In a few more months the trains will be rushing to and fro, binding the business and social relations of this city and Pamlico county even closer than heretofore, and bring greater prosperity to all.
