RALEIGH.

Dissolution of Partnership of Prominent Business Firm.

Delegates Appointed to Attend the American Bar Association Meeting. Removal General Office Farmers Alliance. Money Received for Educational Purposes.

RALEIGH, Aug. 15.—Mr. C. M. Buebe the outgoing president of the North Carolina Bar Association has announced the appointment of the following delegates to the session of the American Bar Association at Saratoga Springs, N. Y. August 27. Fleiss D. Walker, Charlotte; W. D. Fruden, Edenton; E. J. Justice, Marion.

The first official announcement of the death of Capt. J. B. Batcher which occurred August 7th in the Philippines was received here by the family in a telegram from the Adjutant General's office at Washington, stating that the department had just received the report of his death by cable. He was a native of Raleigh and was very popular.

A report being prepared by the superintendent of public instruction shows that North Carolina received \$2,800 last year from the Peabody Educational fund and \$300 from the States fund. The State Normal and Industrial College at Greensboro received \$2,000 of the amount.

The firm of Lee and Latta, one of the most extensive cotton brokerage concerns in this section, will be dissolved by mutual consent Sept. 1. Mr. Lee, who has been in the business since 1872 will locate in some city further south for cotton brokerage purposes. Our Mr Latta will devote his whole time to cotton milling interests. He is president of the Raleigh Cotton Mills.

At the annual meeting of the State Farmer's Alliance at Hillsboro this week it was decided to move the general office from that town to Raleigh, and General agent Parker will locate here in about two weeks. They adopted a resolution asking the next General Assembly to appropriate \$40,000 to the A. & M. College to be used in improving the facilities for instruction in Agriculture.

A BILL IN EQUITY.

To Assist Wilmington and Prevent Discrimination in Freight Rates Against That Place.

RALEIGH, Aug. 15.—United States District Attorney Skinner went to Wilmington today to file a bill in equity in the case of the Interstate Commerce Commission, against the Cincinnati, Portsmouth and Virginia railroad company and about forty other roads, including the Southern, Atlantic Coast Line, Seaboard Air Line and their connections to Chicago, St. Louis, Louisville and to other western points.

The bill is returnable September 29th with another of the defendants October 3rd for further orders.

Three years ago the Interstate Commission sitting in Wilmington, heard the suit brought by the Wilmington Tariff Association against the same defendant read for an adjustment of freight rates, so there would not be any discrimination against Wilmington, as compared with Norfolk, Richmond and other Virginia cities in freights on shipments from western points.
